Clergy Licensed to Officiate

Licenses are issued for a one year period expiring March 1 of each year and must be renewed annually.

The following canon governs priests licensed to officiate:

Canons of the General Convention, Title III, Canon 9, Section 6

(a) No Priest shall preach, minister the Sacraments, or hold any public service, within the limits of any Diocese other than the Diocese in which the Priest is canonically resident for more than two months without a license from the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese in which the Priest desires to so officiate. No Priest shall be denied such a license on account of the Priest’s race, color, ethnic origin, sex, national origin, marital status, sexual orientation, disabilities, or age, except as otherwise provided in these canons. Upon expiration or withdrawal of a license, a priest shall cease immediately to officiate.

Constitution

As approved by the 101st Annual Diocesan Convention, meeting in St. James' Church, Wichita, Kansas, May 1-2, 1960, and as amended by subsequent Conventions.

ARTICLE I

Diocesan Boundaries

The Diocese of Kansas embraces all that part of the State of Kansas lying east of the western boundaries of Washington, Clay, Dickinson, Marion, Harvey, Sedgwick, and Sumner Counties, and as a constituent part of Christ's Holy Catholic Church known as The Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, it accedes to the General Constitution and Canons of that Church, and acknowledges the authority of the same.

ARTICLE II

Ecclesiastical Authority and Governance

Upon the death of the Bishop, a Suffragan Bishop, if there be one, of this Diocese may be placed in charge of the Diocese and become temporarily the Ecclesiastical Authority thereof until such time as a new Diocesan shall be chosen and consecrated; and during the disability or absence of the Bishop, a Suffragan Bishop, if there be one, of this Diocese may be placed in charge of the Diocese and become temporarily the Ecclesiastical Authority thereof. The affairs of the Diocese shall be governed by a Convention as provided in Article IV hereafter and, between meetings of Convention, by a Council of Trustees constituted as provided in Article V hereafter.

ARTICLE III

Diocesan Convention Meeting

Sec. 1. There shall be a celebration of the Holy Communion at each annual and special meeting of Diocesan Convention.

Sec. 2. An annual meeting of Diocesan Convention shall be held in each calendar year at such time and place within the Diocese as shall be designated by the Ecclesiastical Authority as provided by Canon.

Sec. 3. The Ecclesiastical Authority, with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee, may call a special meeting of Diocesan Convention to be held within the Diocese as provided by Canon.

Sec. 4. Diocesan Convention shall have the power to raise money by apportionment on the parishes of the Diocese for the work of the Church.

Sec. 5. Written notice of the meeting of Diocesan Convention shall be given as provided by Canon to all clergy and laity entitled to membership therein and to all parishes entitled to lay representation.

Sec. 6. Written notice of any proposed amendment to the Constitution shall be given

to the members of Diocesan Convention at the time and in the manner that notice of annual meeting is given.

Sec. 7. The notice of a special meeting of Diocesan Convention shall specify the purposes thereof, and no other business shall be transacted.

ARTICLE IV

Diocesan Convention Organization

A. Members of Diocesan Convention.

Sec. 1. The following shall be ex officio members of Diocesan Convention: the Bishop, the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, the Suffragan Bishop, if there be one, all clergy canonically resident in the Diocese and not under discipline, lay members of the Council of Trustees, the Chancellor of the Diocese, the Vice Chancellors of the Diocese, the Treasurer of the Diocese, the Presidents of the Convocations, and deputies to General Convention.

Sec. 2. Lay delegates chosen as provided by Canon from the communicants of each parish entitled to representation shall be members of Diocesan Convention.

B. Officers of Diocesan Convention.

Sec. 1. The Bishop of the Diocese shall be the President of Diocesan Convention and shall preside at the meeting of Diocesan Convention. In the absence of the Bishop, the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, shall preside. In the absence of both the Bishop and the Bishop Coadjutor, if there be one, the Suffragan Bishop, if there be one, shall preside. If there is no Bishop of the Diocese present, then the President of the Standing Committee shall preside.

Sec. 2. The Secretary of Diocesan Convention shall be elected annually by convention and shall hold office until successor is elected. If there be a vacancy or incapacity to act, the Ecclesiastical Authority shall appoint a Secretary pro tem.

Sec. 3. The Treasurer of the Diocese shall be elected by convention for an initial term of one year. Thereafter the Treasurer may be elected for successive three-year terms if so determined by Diocesan Convention. In case of the death of the Treasurer or an inability to act, the Council of Trustees of the Episcopal Diocese of Kansas, Inc. shall appoint a Treasurer pro tem to serve until the next annual meeting of Diocesan Convention.

Sec. 4. The Chancellor of the Diocese and two Vice Chancellors of the Diocese, all of whom shall be licensed to practice law in the State of Kansas, shall be appointed by the Bishop at the Annual Convention and shall serve until their successors are appointed.

C. Terms of Office.

All officers elected or appointed shall serve until their successors are duly elected or appointed and qualified. All lay officers of the Diocese must be communicants in good standing in the Church and canonically resident in the Diocese.

D. Quorum.

One-third of the clergy entitled to membership and lay representation from one-third of the congregations entitled to representation shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of the business of Diocesan Convention.

E. Voting.

On all matters which come before the meeting of Diocesan Convention, the clerical and lay members shall deliberate in one body and shall vote as individuals. Any five

members may request a vote by orders, in which case the concurrence of the votes of the two orders, by not less than a majority in each order, shall be necessary to carry a proposal.

ARTICLE V

The Council of Trustees

Sec. 1. During the period between Conventions of the Diocese, there shall be an interim governing body, answerable to the Convention, which shall govern the affairs of the Diocese and, in the absence of the Bishop, as specified in the General Canons, shall constitute the Ecclesiastical Authority. This interim body shall be styled The Council of Trustees.

Sec. 2. The Council of Trustees shall constitute the Standing Committee and the Finance Committee of the Diocese and exercise all powers and responsibilities placed upon such committees by the Constitution and General Canons of the Episcopal Church.

Sec. 3. The Council of Trustees shall constitute the Trustees of the not-for-profit religious corporation known as The Episcopal Diocese of Kansas, Inc., established under the laws of the state of Kansas.

Sec. 4. The membership of the Council of Trustees shall consist of the following:

(a) One member of the clergy and one lay person elected by each of the boards of the several convocations of the Diocese.

(1) Those elected under this Section shall be elected to three-year terms; a lay person shall be elected by each convocation to take office following the Annual Convention of the Diocese in years evenly divisible by three; a clergy member shall be elected by each convocation to take office in the following year; there shall be no election (unless to fill a vacancy) in the third year.

(2) These elections shall take place at the convocation board meetings immediately preceding the Annual Convention of the Diocese.

(3) Those elected to membership on the Council under this Section shall be confirmed by majority vote of all delegates and clergy attending the next Annual Convention of the Diocese.

(4) Those elected to membership on the Council under this Section shall be both geographically and canonically resident in their respective convocations and, if they are not members of their convocation board, shall have seat, voice, and vote on that board and the executive committee thereof for the term of their office as Trustee.

(b) Three members of the clergy and three lay persons elected by the Annual Convention of the Diocese; they shall be elected to staggered three-year terms. One clergy member and one lay person shall be elected at each Annual Convention.

(c) The Bishop shall be an ex-officio member of the Council of Trustees and shall preside at its meetings.

Sec. 5. The following shall be advisors to the Council of Trustees, entitled to seat and voice, but not vote, at the meetings thereof:

(a) The Treasurer of the Diocese;

(b) The Chancellor of the Diocese;

(c) No more than two members of the Bishop's staff as designated by the Bishop;

(d) A Clerk of the Council of Trustees, if elected by the Council from other than

its elected membership;

(e) Such specialists as the Council of Trustees may, by majority vote, appoint to assist it in its work; such appointments must be renewed annually at the meeting of the Council immediately following the Annual Convention of the Diocese.

Sec. 6. The Council of Trustees of the Diocese of Kansas shall meet regularly, not less frequently than quarterly, and the minutes of its meetings shall be published and one copy distributed to all parishes and congregations of the Diocese for reproduction and distribution to their clergy and lay delegates.

Sec. 7. In the event of a vacancy on the Council of Trustees:

(a) Of a member elected by a convocation: The board of the convocation shall elect, at its next regular meeting, a replacement member of the appropriate Order to serve the remainder of the term; a member so elected shall be confirmed by majority vote of all clergy and delegates attending the Annual Convention of the Diocese next following his or her election.

(b) Of a member elected by the Annual Convention: The Council of Trustees shall appoint a temporary replacement member of the appropriate Order to serve until the next Annual Convention of the Diocese; at that Convention there shall be a special election to fill the remainder of the term.

Sec. 8. Limited Term of Office:

(a) Subject to the provisions of Paragraph (b), below, no elected member of the Council of Trustees shall serve more than two full elective terms in succession without taking two years absence from the Council.

(b) A member of the Council appointed under Section 7 to fill an unexpired term of less than eighteen months shall be eligible to serve two full elective terms before the requirements of Paragraph (a) of this Section shall apply; a member appointed under Section 7 to fill an unexpired term of more than eighteen months shall be eligible to serve only one full elective term before being required to take a two-year hiatus from service on the Council.

ARTICLE VI

Deputies to the General Convention and to the Provincial Synod

Sec. 1. At the annual meeting of the Diocesan Convention next preceding the deadline for certification of deputies to each General Convention, the Convention shall elect, in a manner adopted by the Council of Trustees, four clergy and four lay persons as deputies to represent the Diocese in the General Convention and the Provincial Synod. The Convention shall elect from the remaining nominees four clergy and four lay persons as alternate deputies. Clerical deputies shall be members of this Convention. Lay deputies shall be adult communicants in good standing within the Diocese. Alternate deputies shall serve as necessary according to the order of their election.

Sec. 2. The deputies and alternate deputies shall serve until the election of their successors. If fewer than four of an order's elected deputies or alternate deputies are able to attend a meeting of the General Convention or the Provincial Synod, the Ecclesiastical Authority may at any time appoint additional alternate deputies to ensure full representation from the Diocese.

ARTICLE VII

Election of a Bishop

The election of a Bishop, a Bishop Coadjutor, or a Suffragan Bishop shall take place in a meeting of Diocesan Convention only and by a concurrent vote by orders. Written notice of such election shall be mailed by the Secretary of the Standing Committee at least sixty days prior to the date of the Convention to all clergy and congregations entitled to representation in the meeting of Diocesan Convention. Each clerical and lay member of Diocesan Convention present shall be entitled to one vote. If three-fourths of all the self-governing parishes and one-third of all other parishes or congregations entitled to representation be present, a majority of votes cast in each order shall determine a choice. Otherwise, two-thirds of the votes cast in each order shall be necessary to determine a choice.

ARTICLE VIII

Diocesan Corporations and Institutions

Sec. 1. All real property of the Church within the Diocese of Kansas not held by incorporated parishes canonically organized and all personal property of the Church within the Diocese of Kansas not held by parishes and missions shall be diocesan property and title thereto shall be vested in The Episcopal Diocese of Kansas, Inc.

ARTICLE IX

Amendment

Amendments to this Constitution must be approved by two successive meetings of annual Diocesan Convention by a majority vote of each order.

Amendments to this Constitution become effective at the beginning of the calendar year following the annual Diocesan Convention at which said amendments are finally approved, unless another date is specified in the motion to adopt.

Canons of the Episcopal Diocese of Kansas

(as restated by the 136th Convention; as amended through the 163rd Convention)

I - DEFINITIONS

CANON I.1

- Apportionment** – The money raised from the parishes and other congregations in union with the Convention for the necessary and proper support of the Diocese and of the National Church.
- Archdeacon** – A deacon appointed by the Bishop to assist the Bishop as directed.
- Bishop** – The person elected in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution of the Diocese of Kansas, and ordained and consecrated in accordance with the General Constitution and General Canons for the Government of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, otherwise known as The Episcopal Church, to exercise Ecclesiastical Authority in the Diocese of Kansas. When there is no Bishop in office and where performance of the Bishop's function will not contravene the authority of these canons or the General Canons, the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese as designated by the Constitution shall perform the functions of the Bishop.
- Bylaws** – The Bylaws of The Council of Trustees of the Episcopal Diocese of Kansas, Inc., as they may be adopted and from time to time amended by that body.
- Campus** – A separate physical location for worship and program maintained by an incorporated parish pursuant to the terms of Canon IV.5.
- Campus Missioner** – A priest appointed by the Ecclesiastical Authority to work with the Higher Education Committee to oversee campus ministry activities in the Diocese.
- Canon to the Ordinary** – A priest appointed and employed by the Bishop, with the consent of The Council of Trustees of the Episcopal Diocese of Kansas, Inc., to assist the Bishop as directed.
- Canonical Residence** – That connection with this Diocese which a member of the Clergy acquires:
- (a) by ordination in and for this Diocese, or
 - (b) by transfer to this Diocese and acceptance of Letters Dimissory to the Ecclesiastical Authority thereof.
- Chancellor** – An attorney licensed to practice law in the state of Kansas, appointed by the Bishop to provide legal advice and counsel to the Bishop, to The Council of Trustees of the Episcopal Diocese of Kansas, Inc., and, when directed by the Bishop, to other Diocesan institutions. This designation, when the context requires, shall include the Vice Chancellors.
- Collegial Member of Convention** – A member of the clergy canonically resident in a jurisdiction other than this Diocese (whose transfer to this Diocese is not pending) who may be seated in Convention with voice but not vote.
- Communicant in Good Standing** – That connection with this Diocese which a lay person, who is a member of a parish in this Diocese, acquires by being a communicant in good standing of a congregation in this Diocese, provided

that no person may at any time be a communicant in good standing representing more than one parish.

Constitution – The Constitution of the Episcopal Diocese of Kansas, Inc., as approved by the 101st Annual Diocesan Convention meeting at St. James Church, Wichita, Kansas, May 1 through 2, 1960, as amended by subsequent conventions.

Cure – The spiritual charge of a Parish, or the Parish itself, formerly called the Cure of Souls.

Deputy – A member of the lay or clerical order elected by the Diocesan Convention to sit in the House of Deputies of the General Convention of the Episcopal Church. Deputies are “deputized” by the Convention of the Diocese to speak and vote at the General Convention as the Holy Spirit leads, and to report actions of the General Convention to the Diocese. Deputies are not “representatives” in the sense that they speak and vote the mind of the Diocese or its Convention.

Ex officio – Any person having membership in a body by virtue of an office held by that person. Such member shall be entitled to vote on all matters regularly coming before said body.

General Canons – The Canons for the government of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, otherwise known as The Episcopal Church, adopted in General Convention, as most recently amended.

General Constitution – The Constitution adopted in General Convention in Philadelphia in October 1789, as amended in subsequent General Conventions, for the governance of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, otherwise known as The Episcopal Church.

Interim Pastor – A Priest chosen by the Wardens and Vestry of an incorporated parish, with the approval of the Bishop, to serve an interim period between elected rectors pursuant to the terms of and to accomplish the purposes specified in a Letter of Agreement.

Letter of Agreement – A covenant among a Priest serving as a Pastor, the Bishop and a Congregation acting through its Vestry and Wardens. The Letter of Agreement shall specify the terms of the call of the Pastor, the duties and obligations of each of the parties to the Agreement, the mutual goals and objectives of the parties and the term of the Agreement. The Letter of Agreement for a Rector shall be subject to the provisions of General Canons and Diocesan Canons governing the creation and dissolution of the relationship between a Rector and a Congregation.

Locum Tenens – A Priest appointed by the Bishop in consultation with the Wardens and Vestry of an incorporated parish to perform the duties of a Rector as specified in a Letter of Agreement when the parish is without a Rector or when the Rector is absent for an extended period of time. The provisions of General Canons governing the relationship of a Rector and Congregation shall not apply to a Locum Tenens.

Member – Pursuant to General Canon, all persons who have received the sacrament of holy baptism with water in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, whether in this Church or in another Christian church, and whose baptisms have been duly recorded in this Church, are members. Members shall be listed on the parish register of one parish in this Diocese with which they are associated pursuant to the provisions of General Canon.

Member of Governing Board – A member elected to one of the governing bodies in the church, which shall include parish Vestries, Diocesan Convention, Provincial Synod and General Convention. Unless this requirement is specifically excused by the Ecclesiastical Authority, it shall be a prerequisite to such election that the member be confirmed in accordance with General Canon.

Mission – Any effort, organized or informal, having as its goal the establishing and promotion of the Christian religion.

Parish – A congregation incorporated under the laws of the State of Kansas and admitted into union with the Diocesan Convention. A parish may be designated as a self governing parish under the provisions of Canon IV.5 and otherwise shall be governed by the provisions of Canon IV.4.

Pastor – A Rector, Vicar, Locum Tenens, Priest-in-Charge or Interim Pastor.

Priest-in-Charge – A Priest appointed by the Bishop in consultation with the Wardens and Vestry of an incorporated parish to perform limited functions specified in a Letter of Agreement.

Rector – A priest duly chosen by the Wardens and Vestry of a self governing parish, who is canonically resident in this Diocese and has been admitted into office by the Ecclesiastical Authority. The Bishop shall be Rector of all parishes that are not self governing.

Standing Committee – The Governing Body of the Diocese as prescribed by General Canon and Article V of the Constitution. The Council of Trustees shall be the Standing Committee.

Treasurer – The person elected by Diocesan Convention, in accordance with the Constitution of the Diocese of Kansas, to be responsible for the financial affairs of the Diocese.

Trustees – The Council of Trustees of the Episcopal Diocese of Kansas, Inc., a Kansas corporation, elected by the Congregations of the Diocese in Convention and through their convocations to be the Governing Body of the Diocese in the interim period between Diocesan Conventions. The Trustees shall, in addition, have the authority of the Standing Committee as prescribed by General Canon.

Vicar – A Priest placed in charge of a parish by the Ecclesiastical Authority.

These Canons shall be interpreted in their plain and literal sense except that words specific to either gender shall be read as gender inclusive.

II - DIOCESAN CONVENTION

CANON II.1

Of Clergy Entitled to Membership

Within one week before the convening of Convention the Ecclesiastical Authority shall prepare a list of all clergy entitled to membership therein as provided by the Constitution, annexing the names of their respective parishes, offices, and residences. This list shall be presumptive evidence of the right of those whose names appear thereon to membership in the Diocesan Convention, which may correct and revise the list at any time. The Ecclesiastical Authority may designate any minister ordained in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, qualified under Article VIII of the Constitution of the Episcopal Church and serving a cure in this Diocese, as a member of Convention with seat, voice, and vote. In addition, the Ecclesiastical Authority may designate a member or members of the clergy having a ministry in the Diocese, but not canonically resident in the Diocese, as Collegial Member(s) of Convention, having voice but no vote. This list, as approved by Convention, shall also be presumptive evidence of the right of those whose names appear thereon to membership in their respective Convocation Boards.

Any member of the Clergy entitled to membership in Convention but unable to attend by reason of being on active military service and serving under orders requiring him or her to be outside the continental United States, may participate and vote in Convention by such method (including electronic means) as the Convention may approve.

CANON II.2

Of Attendance

Sec. 1.

a. It shall be the duty of all ordained persons entitled to seats in Convention and Convocation Boards to attend the same.

b. Every parish and campus mission in union with the Convention shall send to the Convention and Convocation Board meetings one or more delegates, not exceeding eight, who shall be communicants sixteen years of age or older, and shall be elected by the congregation to be represented at its annual meeting. Each delegate shall be elected to a term of not less than two years, with one half the terms (or as near thereto as may be) commencing in alternating years. Alternate delegates shall be selected in a like manner in the same number as the delegates are selected, but they shall be designated first, second, and/or third alternate.

Every parish and campus mission's entitled number of lay delegates shall be based on the number of communicants in its last filed annual parochial report. Parishes shall be entitled to lay delegates with the right to a seat and a vote on the following basis:

Campus missions, one delegate

Parishes under 300 communicants, two delegates

Parishes with 300 to 600 communicants, three delegates

Parishes with 601 to 900 communicants, four delegates

- Parishes with 901 to 1200 communicants, five delegates
- Parishes with 1201 to 1500 communicants, six delegates
- Parishes with 1501 to 1800 communicants, seven delegates
- Parishes with more than 1800 communicants, eight delegates

c. Delegates and alternate delegates to the Convention shall also represent their congregations as delegates and alternate delegates to their respective Convocation Boards.

d. Within thirty days following adjournment all diocesan delegates and alternate delegates shall report the actions of Convention and Convocation Boards to their respective Vestries or Bishop's Committees.

Sec. 2. Should one or more of the elected delegates from any parish or campus mission be unable to attend Convention or any meeting of the Convocation Board on which they are entitled to representation, then an alternate or alternates chosen according to Sec. 1 and arranged according to priority of their designation, shall serve as regular delegate or delegates to Convention or Convocation Board. If any of the elected delegates or alternates is unable to attend Convention or Convocation Board meetings, the Rector shall appoint one or more lay delegates to give such parish or campus mission its full representation.

Sec. 3. Evidence of the election of lay delegates shall be on a certificate provided by the Secretary of Convention signed by the Clerk of the congregation or Vestry, or by the Rector or Priest-in-Charge, or by a warden of the congregation.

Sec. 4. Certificates of election of lay delegates and alternates shall be sent to the Office of the Bishop on or before the date specified thereon.

Sec. 5. With the prior written approval of the Bishop, the Kansas Episcopal Youth at an annual Diocesan Kansas Episcopal Youth assembly may elect four (4) lay delegates, each of whom shall be entitled to a seat and a vote at the annual Diocesan Convention, and a seat and a vote at the Convocation meetings in which each delegate resides, provided that:

a. Written notice of such assembly shall be given not less than thirty (30) days in advance of the date thereof. Announcement in any church publication of general circulation within the Diocese shall constitute sufficient invitation and written notice.

b. No student, who is enrolled in a university, college, or junior college campus within the Diocese where a campus mission organized under Section 2. b. of Canon IV.4 exists, shall be eligible to be elected as a lay delegate or alternate from such assembly, although such student may be an elector.

c. The qualifications, election, duties, and rights of such delegates and their alternates shall be the same in all other respects as those prescribed by the foregoing sections of this Canon respecting delegates from parishes and campus missions.

d. Evidence of the qualifications and election of such delegates and their alternates shall be a certificate in substantially the same form as herein above prescribed in Section 3, signed by a priest appointed by the Bishop for that purpose.

Sec. 6. Any communicant in good standing in a parish of the Diocese who holds a national church office, or is the chief executive officer of a Diocesan institution shall, by the Convention, be granted seat and voice in its deliberations.

CANON II.3
Of Representation and Liability

Sec. 1. Any parish which has not paid all of its apportionment for the year immediately prior to the year in which each annual meeting is held shall not be entitled to lay representation in Convention until such apportionment is paid, unless, by a majority vote of the Convention, voting by orders, the parish is granted representation, and every parish shall remain liable for all of its unpaid apportionments, unless, by a majority vote of the Convention, voting by orders, that liability (or any portion thereof) is excused; Provided that such parish shall, at least 120 days prior to the date of convention, request in writing to the Ecclesiastical Authority, that it be entitled to representation at such Convention or that its unpaid apportionments (or portion thereof) identified by amount and year of apportionment be exonerated, or both, and that it be granted a hearing on its above requests. Such request shall contain an agreement by the Vestry of such parish that it will make a full disclosure of all facts and circumstances requested of it. Thereafter:

a. A hearing on such a request from any parish shall be held before the Trustees not less than 10 days prior to the Convention. Such parishes shall receive at least 30 days written notice of the time and place of such hearing.

b. At the hearing, the Trustees may adopt such rules as appear to be in the best interest of the Diocese, and may, prior to the hearing, require of such parish that it fully disclose its resources to such person or persons as the Trustees designate for such purpose.

c. The Trustees shall make its recommendation to the Convention on the requests made by the parish.

Sec. 2. Any parish three or more months in arrears in payment of any assessment levied for The Church Pension Fund shall be denied lay representation in the Convention.

Sec. 3. If a parish for any reason whatsoever is not represented in Convention, it shall nevertheless be bound by all acts of that Convention.

Sec. 4. The lay delegations to the Convention from each parish shall not be seated in Convention unless the Secretary of Convention has determined that the parish corporation is in good standing in the office of the Secretary of State of Kansas. Any parish may satisfy this requirement by providing to the Secretary of Convention a current certificate of good standing issued by the Secretary of State of Kansas.

CANON II.4
Of Meetings

Sec. 1. The Ecclesiastical Authority shall choose the time and place of the annual and any special meetings of Convention.

Sec. 2. Written notice of Convention shall be given at least thirty days in advance of the date thereof to all clergy and laity entitled to membership therein and to all Clerks of Vestries of congregations entitled to representation.

Sec. 3. Announcement in any church publication of general circulation within the Diocese shall constitute written notice of any meeting of Convention.

Sec. 4. The Ecclesiastical Authority shall establish a time line prior to each such Convention for the reports of committees as provided in Canon II.5.

CANON II.5

Of Business

Sec. 1. Of Committees

a. At each Annual Convention of the Diocese, the Ecclesiastical Authority shall appoint the following committees, which shall serve until the adjournment of the next succeeding Annual Convention:

1. Committee on Nominations and Elections
2. Committee on Constitution and Canons
3. Committee on Debatable Resolutions
4. Committee on Dispatch of Business
5. Committee on Courtesy Resolutions
6. Committee on Arrangements

7. Such other committee or committees as the Ecclesiastical Authority may deem advisable.

b. At each Convention, the Ecclesiastical Authority shall appoint a committee to approve the minutes of that Convention.

c. For any Special Convention, the Ecclesiastical Authority shall appoint such committees as may be deemed advisable at least thirty days before the convening of the Convention.

Sec 2. Of Nominations and Elections

a. At least 90 days prior to the convening of the annual Convention, the Diocese shall be informed of the positions and offices to be filled by election at the annual Convention, together with the responsibilities and qualifications for such positions and offices. Nominations to the positions and offices shall be solicited from throughout the Diocese to be received no later than the deadline established pursuant to Section 4 of Canon II.4 by the Ecclesiastical Authority.

b. The Committee on Nominations and Elections shall receive such nominations and may take steps to assure that an adequate number of nominations is presented at the Convention. The Committee may cause to be prepared biographical information about such nominees to be presented to the Convention.

c. The Committee shall oversee the elections and the training of the tellers thereof. The Committee shall see that the records of all elections and the ballots of all elections are preserved as may be required for the Diocesan history and archives.

Sec. 3. Of Amendments to the Constitution and Canons

a. Amendments to the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese to be considered by Convention shall be submitted, in writing signed by the proposer, to the Committee on Constitution and Canons no later than the deadline established pursuant to Section 4 of Canon II.4 by the Ecclesiastical Authority.

b. The Committee on Constitution and Canons shall be responsible for determining the legality of each proposal and may assure that the language and form conforms to that of the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese.

c. The Committee shall prepare a report on all such proposals and forward it to the Secretary of the Convention not later than the deadline established pursuant to Section 4 of Canon II.4 by the Ecclesiastical Authority.

d. The Committee will prepare proposed amendments or supplements to the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese if so directed by the Convention or Ecclesiastical Authority.

Sec. 4. Of Debatable Resolutions

a. All resolutions to be considered by Convention, excepting those courtesy resolutions submitted by the Committee on Courtesy Resolutions, the Trustees, or the Deputies to General Convention, shall be submitted, in writing, signed by the proposer or proposers, to the Committee on Debatable Resolutions no later than the deadline established pursuant to Section 4 of Canon II.4 by the Ecclesiastical Authority.

b. The Committee on Debatable Resolutions shall be responsible for determining that the resolutions are in proper form, and in the case of two or more resolutions seeking the same or similar action by the Convention, seeking a unified resolution from the several proposers. In the event that two or more resolutions seek opposite or differing action from the Convention, the Committee shall recommend the order in which they are to be presented to the Convention and shall inform the Convention as to how the action on the earlier resolution to be considered will affect those that come later.

c. The Committee shall prepare a report of its actions and forward it to the Secretary of Convention together with the resolutions to be presented to Convention, not later than the deadline established pursuant to Section 4 of Canon II.4 by the Ecclesiastical Authority.

Sec. 5. Of the Secretary of Convention

a. The Secretary of Convention shall cause to be prepared copies of the proposed amendments or supplements to the Constitution and Canons together with the recommendations of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, together with the information from the Committee on Debatable Resolutions, and distribute them to the delegates at least 30 days before the convening of Convention. These shall be sent to the Clerk of the Vestry of each congregation in a number sufficient for that congregation's delegates to Convention, and to each ex-officio member of Convention.

Sec. 6. Of Appeals for Extenuating Circumstances

a. In the event of proposed amendments or debatable resolutions arising too late to meet the time requirements of this Canon, any member of the Convention may appeal through the Committee on Dispatch of Business for permission to present such proposals to the Convention. Said Committee shall affirm or deny that extenuating circumstances exist.

b. The Convention may, by majority vote, waive the time provisions of this Canon under such an appeal. Debate on the motion of appeal shall be limited to the existence of extenuating circumstances.

c. An appeal under the provisions of this section of this Canon must be made at the time of the report of the Committee on Dispatch of Business.

CANON II.6
Of the Journal

The Secretary of Convention, with the advice of the committee to approve the minutes of Convention, shall have the *Journal* of the proceedings printed. The Secretary shall distribute one copy of the *Journal* to all clergy canonically resident in the Diocese of Kansas and otherwise as directed by the General Canons of the Church and by the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese not later than the meeting of Convocations prior to the convening of the Diocesan Convention.

CANON II.7
Of the Election of the Council of Trustees

Sec. 1. The election of the Council of Trustees shall be conducted pursuant to Article 5 of the Constitution.

Sec. 2. At the 145th and subsequent Annual Conventions, no person employed on a full time or part time basis as a member of the Diocesan staff shall be eligible for election or appointment to the Council of Trustees and any member of the Council of Trustees who becomes a part time or full time member of Diocesan staff shall be disqualified from further service.

III - ORGANIZATION AND ADMINISTRATION

CANON III.1
Of the Council of Trustees

Sec. 1. In the interim period between conventions, the affairs of the Diocese shall be governed by the Council of Trustees selected pursuant to provisions of the Constitution and these Canons. The Bishop shall serve as Chairman of the Council of Trustees and the Council shall elect a Secretary and shall designate as its Treasurer the Treasurer of the Episcopal Diocese of Kansas appointed in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution.

Sec. 2. The Council of Trustees shall be responsible for all functions of the Standing Committee as prescribed by General Canons. The Council of Trustees shall elect a President who shall preside at its meetings in the absence of the Chairman and may preside at such other times as it may be necessary or appropriate for the Bishop to relinquish the chair.

Sec. 3. In addition to regularly scheduled meetings of the Council of Trustees, special meetings may be called by the Bishop or by the President of the Council of Trustees. In addition, special meetings shall be called at the written request of three members of the Council of Trustees other than the President. The Bishop shall be notified of any such specially called meeting but may be excluded from attendance when the agenda for the meeting is limited to matters reserved to Standing Committees by the General Canons.

In the event the Bishop is not elected President of the Council of Trustees, the Bishop shall nonetheless serve as Chairman thereof with respect to all functions other than those reserved by General Canon to the Standing Committee.

CANON III.2

Of Archdeacons and the Canon to the Ordinary

Sec. 1. The Bishop, with the advice and consent of the Trustees, may appoint an Archdeacon or Archdeacons to assist the Bishop in the ministry of the deacons of the Diocese.

Sec. 2. The duties of each Archdeacon shall be determined by the Bishop.

Sec. 3. Compensation for each Archdeacon shall be agreed upon by the Archdeacon and the Bishop and approved by the Trustees.

Sec. 4. The Bishop, with the advice and consent of the Trustees, may appoint and employ a Canon to the Ordinary.

Sec. 5. Compensation for the Canon to the Ordinary shall be agreed upon by the Bishop and the Canon to the Ordinary, and approved by the Trustees.

Sec. 6. The duties of the Canon to the Ordinary shall be determined by the Bishop.

CANON III.3

Of the Disciplinary Board and the Discipline of Members of the Clergy

Sec. 1. There is hereby established for the Diocese of Kansas a court to be known as the Disciplinary Board, to consist of seven members, three of whom are lay persons, confirmed communicants in good standing in the Diocese, and four of whom shall be priests or deacons canonically resident in the Diocese. No member of the Council of Trustees shall serve as a member of the Disciplinary Board. They shall elect a President from their own number within sixty (60) days following each annual Diocesan Convention.

Sec. 2. Each annual Convention next following the General Convention shall elect the members of the Disciplinary Board to serve for a period of three years; provided that the judges of the Ecclesiastical Trial Court in office at the 151st Diocesan Convention shall serve as members of the Disciplinary Board until the 153rd Convention.

Sec. 3. Vacancies occurring in the Disciplinary Board shall be filled by the Ecclesiastical Authority until the next annual Convention, at which time members shall be elected to fill out the unexpired terms.

Sec. 4. Except as specifically provided in this Canon, the Disciplinary Board shall be governed by Title IV of the General Canons.

Sec. 5. The Bishop shall, at the annual Convention appoint one or more Intake Officers as defined by General Canon IV.2 to perform the functions described in General Canon IV.6. In addition, the Bishop shall at each annual Convention appoint, with the consent of the Convention, one or more independent Church Attorneys to perform functions as appropriate under Title IV of the General Canons.

Sec. 6. All charges against a priest or deacon of this church cognizable in this Diocese shall be governed, except as herein set out, by the provisions of Title IV of the General Canons.

CANON III.4

Of the Diocesan Commission on Ministry

Sec. 1. At Diocesan Convention the Bishop shall nominate and the Convention shall confirm a Commission on Ministry to consist of not less than six (6) members, which shall include both clergy and lay persons, and their terms of office shall be three years. Should vacancies occur during the adjournment of Convention, the Bishop shall nominate to the Council of Trustees acting as the Standing Committee, upon whose confirmation the person or persons so designated shall be added to the Commission and serve until the next meeting of Convention.

Sec. 2. The duties of the commission shall be those set forth in the Canons of the General Convention of the Episcopal Church, and such other duties as the Bishop may appropriately assign.

Sec. 3. The commission shall report to each annual Convention of the Diocese.

CANON III.5

Of Convocations

Sec. 1. Locations. The Diocese of Kansas is hereby divided into four Convocations, known as Northeast, Northwest, Southeast, and Southwest. The Ecclesiastical Authority shall define the territorial limits of the Convocations and shall assign each parish membership in one of the Convocations thereof.

Sec. 2. The Convocation Board. Lay Convention Delegates from the Convocation (including delegates from campus missions and youth delegates) elected pursuant to Canon II.2, the lay member of the Council of Trustees elected pursuant to Article V of the Constitution by the Convocation, and the clergy assigned to parishes in or, if not assigned to a parish, resident in the Convocation and canonically resident in the Diocese shall comprise the Convocation Board.

Sec. 3. Bylaws. Each Convocation shall, with the approval of the Council of Trustees, adopt bylaws to govern the operation of its Convocation Board. Bylaws should be reviewed and submitted to the Council of Trustees for approval every five years.

Sec. 4. Duties. The Board shall meet at least three times a year. One of the three meetings shall be held within 45 days prior to each Diocesan Convention to consider items proposed to come before Convention, and one shall be held before the deadline established pursuant to Section 4 of Canon II.4 by the Ecclesiastical Authority to consider and propose the items of Convention business contemplated by Canon II.5. Other duties include recommendations for action on requests for apportionment waivers as described in Canon IV.2. The Convocation Board shall not have authority to approve resolutions that impact local parish budgets without approval by the vestry of the parish impacted.

CANON III.6
Of Deans of Convocation

Sec. 1. The Bishop may appoint as Dean of the Convocation a priest in each Convocation. These Deans and the Dean of the Cathedral shall serve as a council of pastoral advice and assistance to the Bishop.

Sec. 2. The terms of office and duties of each Convocation Dean shall be determined by the Bishop.

Sec. 3. Any compensation paid to a Convocation Dean shall be agreed upon by the Bishop and such Dean, subject to the approval of the Trustees.

CANON III.7
Of Minsters

Sec. 1. Locations. The Diocese of Kansas will be divided into minsters. The Ecclesiastical Authority shall designate the number of minsters, and shall assign each parish to one of the minsters.

Sec. 2. The Minster Team. The Minster Team members shall consist of a Minster Shepherd, appointed by the Ecclesiastical Authority for each minster, all clergy, and lay representation from each parish in the minster.

Sec. 3. Meetings. Each Minster Team shall meet not less than once every two (2) months, or as directed by the Ecclesiastical Authority.

Sec. 4. Responsibilities. Each minster shall consist of geographically proximate parishes gathered together for relationship, ministry, sacramental provision, and mission in their shared neighborhood.

CANON III.8
Of the Registrar and Historiographer

Sec. 1. At each Annual Convention the Ecclesiastical Authority shall appoint with the approval of Convention a Registrar and Historiographer.

Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the Registrar and Historiographer:

(a) To collect and preserve copies of the official *Journal* of the Diocese, the Diocesan newspaper, and all other important publications and documents which shall pertain to the historic record of the Diocese and the congregations thereof, except as such documents are a proper part of the permanent files of other officers of the Diocese.

(b) To answer proper requests for information and when authorized by the Bishop or other Ecclesiastical Authority, to issue a certified copy or statement of any matter of record in the Registrar's files.

CANON III.9

Of the Commission on Church Architecture and Allied Arts

Sec. 1. At each Annual Convention the Ecclesiastical Authority shall appoint a Commission on Church Architecture and Allied Arts, composed of clergy and professional lay persons qualified in one of the allied arts.

Sec. 2. To this Commission shall be submitted for review and approval all proposed preliminary plans for new buildings, alterations and additions to existing buildings, together with such supporting data and information as may be needed for review by the Commission. The Commission shall report its approval or disapproval to the Ecclesiastical Authority and shall make a written report of its activities to each annual Convention.

IV - INSTITUTIONS AND CONGREGATIONS

CANON IV.1

Of Institutions

Sec. 1. No institutions shall be formed within the bounds of the Diocese of Kansas unless express approval in writing shall be given by the Bishop and the Trustees.

Sec. 2. No institution hereafter formed and incorporated shall represent itself to be an institution of the Diocese of Kansas for any purpose whatsoever unless it shall have qualified and shall continue to qualify as a Diocesan Institution as provided herein.

Sec. 3. To qualify as a Diocesan Institution, each institution of the Church within the Diocese of Kansas shall be incorporated as a charitable or non-profit corporation of the state of Kansas and shall duly maintain such corporate status, first obtaining from the Ecclesiastical Authority and the Trustees their written approval of its Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws.

Sec. 4. Every Diocesan Institution, in its Articles of Incorporation, shall accede expressly to the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese of Kansas.

Sec. 5. The Articles of Incorporation or the Bylaws of Diocesan Institutions shall contain the following provisions:

a. The Ecclesiastical Authority shall be a member ex-officio of the board of directors of the Diocesan Institution.

b. No less than a sixty percent majority of the board of directors of the Diocesan Institution shall be communicants of the church in good standing.

c. The Diocesan Institution shall not alienate or encumber any real property belonging to it without first obtaining the written consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority and the Trustees.

d. The Diocesan Institution shall not amend its Articles of Incorporation without the written consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority and the Trustees.

e. The Bishop, with the advice of Diocesan Convention and consent of a two-thirds majority thereof, may dissolve the organization of any Diocesan Institution provided that written notice of intention to do so shall have been made to the ex-officio membership and the lay representation of Convention at least thirty days in advance of the convening thereof.

f. Upon the dissolution of a Diocesan Institution, the title to its property, both real and personal, shall pass and be transferred and conveyed to the diocesan corporation known as The Episcopal Diocese of Kansas, Inc.

g. Upon the dissolution of a Diocesan Institution the governing body thereof shall forthwith legally dissolve said corporation under the laws of the state of Kansas.

Sec. 6. Upon approval of the Ecclesiastical Authority and the Trustees and pursuant to such written agreement as they may approve, Bishop Seabury Academy, a Diocesan Institution, may affiliate with an institution not qualified under the terms of Section 5 above in the performance of its stated purpose. The Diocesan Institution shall retain responsibility for the function specified in the said agreement for which it is qualified as a Diocesan Institution, but would not be required to be the owner of real or personal property or to perform such support functions incidental to its purpose as may be assigned to the other institution pursuant to the agreement.

Sec. 7. The Bishop shall be the Visitor of all Diocesan Institutions, with Ordinary jurisdiction over the chapels and houses of worship belonging thereto; provided, however, that the Bishop may delegate this faculty in writing to bishops or priests canonically resident in the Diocese.

Sec. 8. No Diocesan Institution shall employ the services of an extra diocesan bishop or priest or invite such person to officiate for more than two months in the Diocese of Kansas without first obtaining the consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority.

Sec. 9. Each Diocesan Institution shall make an annual written report to Convention, setting forth its financial status and its activities during the preceding year.

CANON IV.2 Of Apportionments

Sec. 1. The Convention of the Diocese of Kansas shall adopt an apportionment for each parish of the diocese for the amounts necessary to pay for the missionary work of the Church, and program of the diocese and the support of the Episcopate as determined by the Annual, or any Special, meeting of the Diocesan Convention.

Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the treasurer of each parish to remit on the last day of each month to the Treasurer of the Diocese one-twelfth of the annual Diocesan Apportionment approved for that parish by the Diocesan Convention. A report shall be made to the Bishop by the 5th day of each month showing the amounts paid by each congregation toward its apportionment. The Bishop and Trustees may take such action as they deem appropriate concerning any congregation that fails to pay its apportionment regularly and on time.

Sec. 3.

For purposes of this Canon, the following definitions shall apply:

Normal Operating Income is that amount reported in “Box A” on the annual Parochial Report required by the General Canons of the Episcopal Church. There shall be excluded from Normal Operating Income payments to retire debt incurred to expand or update the facilities of a congregation. A congregation that wishes to have a debt so excluded from Normal Operating Income must submit its plans to its respective Convocation Board for recommendations to the Council of Trustees of the Diocese.

Sec. 4. For the purposes of the Diocesan Apportionment:

a. Each parish shall be assessed at (i) a base rate of 12% of the first \$50,000, or fraction thereof, of its Normal Operating Income for its last year of record, (ii) a base rate of 15% of the next \$50,000, or fraction thereof, of its Normal Operating Income for its last year of record, and (iii) a base rate of 18% of that portion of its Normal Operating Income for its last year of record which exceeds \$100,000.

b. The base rates as stated above in this section shall be increased or decreased by the same proportioned amounts expressed in percentage as may be necessary in order that the amounts assessed against all parishes be sufficient to fund the budget approved by the Diocesan Convention, provided that no parish shall be assessed an amount exceeding 20% of its Normal Operating Income for its last year of record.

Sec. 5. Appeal due to reporting error

If a reporting error is discovered that would change a parish's previously reported Normal Operating Income, that parish has three years from the year of error to report the error to the Treasurer of the Diocese. The Treasurer and Finance Committee (or an appointed subcommittee of the same) will review the report in accordance with guidelines established by the Finance Committee and approved by the Council of Trustees. Following review, a report and any recommendations for remediation in a future budget year will be made to the Council of Trustees, the decision of the Council being then communicated to the appealing parish.

Sec. 6. This Canon shall be effective for funding budget year 2018 and shall be reviewed at least every ten (10) years by a committee appointed by the Bishop.

CANON IV.3
Of the Cathedral

Sec. 1. The Convention of the Diocese acknowledging primitive usage, admitting the see city to be a necessary element in episcopacy, and believing the cathedral therein to be an essential organ of the Bishop for the reality of the episcopal office and the discharge of the Bishop's duties, hereby recognizes the idea and the fact of the cathedral in the see city, as a proper prerogative of the Bishop.

Sec. 2. A Dean, to be nominated by the Bishop, shall be elected or appointed by the Vestry of the cathedral church, and shall have charge of the cathedral congregation.

Sec. 3. The cathedral church shall be a parish, with the usual parochial organizations, and with all the rights and privileges of any parish.

Sec. 4. Grace Church, in the See City of Topeka, is hereby adopted and constituted the Cathedral Church of the Diocese of Kansas.

CANON IV.4 Of Congregations

Sec. 1. Congregations other than self governing parishes may be organized or dissolved at the discretion of the Bishop.

Sec. 2.

a. A congregation thus organized shall be governed pursuant to and in accordance with these Canons and such other conditions as the Bishop may deem necessary.

b. A congregation organized upon the campus of any university, college, or junior college situated within the Diocese shall be known as a campus mission, and shall be under the authority of the Bishop.

c. Upon the organization of a congregation and notification thereof by the Bishop to the Secretary of the Convention, such congregation shall be entitled to lay representation in the Diocesan Convention according to the provisions of the Constitution and Canons of this Diocese.

Sec. 3. A parish may be established in the Diocese of Kansas in the following manner.

a. The Bishop of the Diocese of Kansas may desire to establish a Parish in a given location and contact people in that area, including a reasonable number of communicants of the Episcopal Church.

Alternatively, a reasonable number of communicants of the Episcopal Church, which includes at least three (3) confirmed communicants aged 18 years or over, may desire to establish a Parish. In either case, the people and the Bishop shall meet and consult together. If the people and the Bishop desire to continue the endeavor, the Bishop may authorize the people to meet as a worshipping community subject to the canons of the Episcopal Church and of The Diocese of Kansas and to any requirements the Bishop of Kansas may further set forth in writing. The Bishop may assign a Minister to lead the group during this time. When the people desire to establish a Parish, they may apply to the Bishop for permission to make application to the Convention. Upon approval by the Bishop, the people may then petition the Convention as set forth in subsection (b) below.

b. After receiving the Bishop's approval, the people desiring to establish a Parish shall submit two copies of the following petition at least forty days and not more than ninety days before the Diocesan Convention to be held next thereafter. The petition shall be signed by not less than three members of the group aged eighteen years or over who are confirmed communicants of the Episcopal Church. Any Minister in charge of the group, shall approve the petition by signature thereon.

Petition

We whose names are signed below, and who are confirmed in the Episcopal Church or who are desirous of being confirmed communicants of the Episcopal Church, deeply sensible of the truth of the Christian Religion and conscientiously attached to the Doctrine, Discipline, and Worship of the Church known as the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, and being desirous of further establishing its authority and securing its holy influences for ourselves, our families and neighbors and those who

come after us, do hereby respectfully petition the Ecclesiastical Authority and the Convention of the Diocese of Kansas, that we be granted the status of a Parish of the Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Kansas, under the name and title of **N**, and we do hereby solemnly promise and declare that the said Parish shall forever be held under the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese of Kansas, the authority which we do recognize, and to the liturgy, doctrine, discipline, rites and usages of the Episcopal Church in the United States of America we promise for ourselves and our successors corporate obedience and conformity at all times, so help us God.

Furthermore, we solemnly engage and stipulate that all real and personal property of which the Parish is or may become possessed is held in trust for this Church and the Diocese of Kansas and shall be secured against alienation from the Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Kansas unless such alienation shall be in conformity with its Canons.

c. Articles of incorporation (two copies) in a form approved by the Bishop and filed with the Secretary of the State of Kansas are to be presented at the same time as the above petition.

d. The Bishop shall refer the petition to the Convention of the Diocese with any recommendations. The Convention of the Diocese meeting next after the submission of the petition shall act on it. Upon approval by the Convention of the petition for admission as a Parish, the group is thereupon admitted into union with the Bishop and the Convention as a Parish.

Sec. 4. The government of all parishes and congregations organized under the provisions of this Canon shall be vested in the Bishop as Rector, who may appoint a Vicar as representative of the Rector. The Vicar shall conform to the instruction of, and be accountable to, the Rector.

Sec. 5. The Rector, having chosen a method, shall appoint a Vestry, consisting of a warden, a clerk, a treasurer and committee Members, in number as the Rector deems appropriate. The members of the Vestry shall be the Trustees of the parish corporation whose actions shall be, however, subject to approval and ratification by the Bishop and the Council of Trustees. With written approval from the Rector, a parish may operate in accordance with Canon IV.5, Sections 5 through 8 or such portion of those provisions as the Rector deems appropriate. The Rector, or in the Rector's absence, the Vicar shall preside at the Vestry meetings.

Sec. 6. The Treasurer of the Vestry shall keep an accurate book of accounts and shall submit to the Vestry a monthly statement of receipts, disbursements and cash or equivalent on hand in such form as they shall direct. In addition, the Treasurer shall prepare for their approval and submission to the Bishop and Trustees all such reports and other financial information as may be required by them from time to time.

Sec. 7. The Clerk of the Vestry shall take minutes of all meetings of the Vestry, and shall cause such minutes to properly be kept and maintained, and transmitted to the Rector without delay.

CANON IV.5

Of Self Governing Parishes

Sec. 1. No parish shall be authorized to provide its own governance under the terms of this Canon until it has been in union with the Convention of the Diocese of Kansas as a parish or as a campus of a self governing parish pursuant to a plan of organization described in Section 3 of this Canon for at least one year.

Sec. 2. A parish may be authorized by the Bishop to be a self governing parish when it shall meet the requirements of the Canons and such other conditions not inconsistent therewith as shall from time to time be required by the Bishop.

Sec. 3. An incorporated parish in good standing may be authorized by the Bishop, acting with the advice and consent of the Council of Trustees in its capacity as the Standing Committee of the Diocese, to acquire or establish a campus in a location other than its primary location. A separate campus shall be established pursuant to a plan of organization developed after consultation with the Convocation Board of the Convocation in which the sponsoring parish is located (and the Convocation Board in which the separate campus is located if it is in a different Convocation). A separate campus shall be organized pursuant to the plan of organization as a part of the sponsoring parish, shall be subject to governance by the Vestry of the sponsoring parish and shall not constitute a separate diocesan institution.

Sec. 4. Any congregation organized and maintained by a self governing parish may apply for permission to incorporate only after it has satisfied all claims resting upon it by the organizing parish.

Sec. 5. No parish shall file articles of incorporation as provided by the state of Kansas unless such articles of incorporation be in accord with and accede expressly to the Constitution and Canons of the Episcopal Church, and to the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese of Kansas, and shall have received first the written approval of the Bishop, acting with the advice and consent of the Council of Trustees in its capacity as the Standing Committee of the Diocese. No parish shall adopt or amend articles of incorporation, bylaws or other governing documents for the parish or subsidiary entities without the approval in writing of the Bishop.

Sec. 6. The Vestry, Trustees of the Parish Corporation

a. Membership. Every self governing parish shall be governed by a Vestry, which shall consist of the Rector, a Senior Warden, a Junior Warden, and no fewer than three additional members. The members of the Vestry shall be the trustees of the parish corporation, and shall share with the Rector a concern and responsibility for the mission, ministry, and spiritual life of the parish.

b. Election. The Wardens and members of the Vestry shall be elected annually in accordance with the bylaws of each parish.

(1) The Wardens shall be elected annually. Each shall hold office for not more than three successive one-year terms and shall not be eligible to be elected as a member of the Vestry until after the expiration of one year from the date of previous service. In the event of a vacancy occurring in the office of either Warden, the Vestry shall have power to fill the vacancy.

(2) Members of the Vestry shall be elected for three-year terms, with one-third (or

as near to that portion as may be) of the members of the Vestry being elected each year. If local parish bylaws so provide, members of the Vestry may be elected to shorter terms. If local parish bylaws so provide, a member of the Vestry may be re-elected to a second consecutive three year term or to an additional shorter term, provided that no person shall be elected to a shorter term consecutive to a prior term that would result in continuous service of more than six years on the Vestry. Except as before noted, no member of the Vestry shall be eligible for re-election until after the expiration of one year from the date of termination of previous service. Vacancies occurring on the Vestry may be filled by the Vestry until the next annual parish meeting, at which time an election shall be held for the unexpired term or terms. Provided, however, that no member of the Vestry so appointed by the Vestry shall be ineligible for election to the Vestry.

(3) The Vestry, at its first meeting after the annual parish meeting, shall elect a Clerk of the Vestry and a parish Treasurer, both of whom must be qualified electors in the parish, but need not be members of the Vestry.

(4) In the event that a member of the Vestry shall fail for a period of three months to attend Vestry meetings, the Vestry shall give written notice to such member that failure to attend the next regular meeting or to provide satisfactory reason for failure to attend, shall be evidence of his inability or lack of desire to serve. In such case, if the member does not attend the next meeting and does not provide reason satisfactory to a majority of the other members of the Vestry, the Vestry shall declare the office vacant and notify the member of their action.

c. Meetings. The Vestry shall meet at least bi-monthly. It shall be the duty of every member of the Vestry to attend regularly the meetings of the Vestry.

(1) Special meetings of the Vestry may be called by the Rector, and shall be called at the written request of three members of the Vestry, including one Warden. Notice of such meetings shall be in writing to the members of the Vestry not later than twenty-four hours prior to the hour fixed for the meeting, except that a Vestry meeting may be held at any hour without notice, the Rector consenting, providing that every member of the Vestry shall be present.

(2) There shall be no meeting of the Vestry unless the Rector, if there is one, and a majority of the Vestry be present; provided, if the Rector is absent from the Diocese two calendar months, or if when duly notified of such meeting shall consent to the meeting or decline or neglect to be present, the Vestry shall be competent to transact business if there be a majority of the Vestry, including one Warden, present.

Sec. 7. The Annual Parish Meeting shall be held during the month of January at a time and place within the Parish specified by the Rector. Delegates to Diocesan Convention and the Convocation in which the Parish is located shall be elected as provided in Canon II.2 at the Annual Parish Meeting and such other business as is authorized by the Parish bylaws shall be conducted. Special Parish Meetings may be called as specified in the Parish Bylaws or, if there is no provision in the Parish Bylaws, may be called for any purpose specified in the notice of such Special Parish Meeting by the Rector, the Senior Warden or three members of the Vestry upon no less than ten days notice to the Parish. All adult communicants in good standing as determined by the Rector who are members of the Parish, all as defined by Canon I.1, shall be entitled to vote at any Parish meeting. The Rector, or, if the Rector is the Bishop, the person delegated by the Rector, shall preside

at all regular meetings of the Parish. In the Rector's absence, the Senior Warden, or in the absence of both, the Junior Warden shall preside.

Sec. 8. At each Episcopal Visitation the alms and contributions not otherwise specifically designated shall belong to the Bishop's Discretionary Fund.

Sec. 9. The Treasurer of each self governing parish shall keep an accurate book of accounts and shall submit to the Vestry a monthly statement of receipts, disbursements, and cash or equivalent on hand in such form as the Vestry shall direct. In addition, the Treasurer shall prepare and submit to the Bishop and the Trustees for their approval all such reports and other financial information as may be required from time to time.

Sec. 10. The Clerk of the Vestry shall take minutes of all meetings of the Vestry, and shall cause such minutes to be properly kept and maintained.

CANON IV.6

Of Ordained Ministers and Their Duties

The Rector or priest or deacon-in-charge of a parish or campus mission, by virtue of such office, has the powers and duties conferred by the General Canons of the Church, and in this connection shall exercise pastoral oversight of all guilds and societies within the parish, and is entitled to speak and vote on all questions before these bodies.

CANON IV.7

Of Restoring Congregational Health

Sec. 1. The Rector and both Wardens, a majority of the Vestry of a parish, the Bishop, or the Council of Trustees acting as the Standing Committee of the Diocese by a vote of two-thirds of its members, may petition the Ecclesiastical Authority to initiate an inquiry into whether the continued health of a parish appears to be in jeopardy such that a degree of Episcopal intervention or oversight is needed as a means of restoring the health of the Congregation.

Sec. 2. A plan for restoring congregational health may not be made except upon a finding, following inquiry, that one or more of the following conditions exist in the Parish:

- a. Failure to elect a Vestry or a Rector (where the parish is without a Rector).
- b. Failure to pay clergy compensation outlined in a Letter of Agreement, including Pension assessments and insurance premiums.
- c. Failure or neglect for three months or more to pay duly assessed diocesan apportionments without an explicit plan for payment of such.
- d. Persistent and significant instability or decline in the financial or temporal condition of the Parish including, but not limited to, the invasion of the principal portion of an endowment or trust fund.
- e. Persistent failure or neglect to conform to the Business Methods in Church Affairs required by the Constitution and Canons of the General Convention of the Episcopal Church or of the Diocese, including those requirements relating to the bonding of treasurers or other custodians of funds, proper record keeping, proper maintenance of books of account, annual audit, and the maintenance of adequate

insurance.

f. Failure to complete and file audit reports per diocesan policy.

g. Failure to complete and file parochial reports per diocesan and Episcopal Church policy.

h. Persistent failure to provide for and fund adequate health insurance for all eligible clergy and lay employees, according to the provisions in the Canons of the Episcopal Church.

i. Persistent failure to keep all buildings, structures, tangible property of the Parish adequately insured against loss or to pay such insurance premiums.

j. Failure to cooperate in an inquiry under this Canon, or in connection with any other canonical inquiry by the Ecclesiastical Authority or its designee, including the failure or refusal to provide full and accurate information on the state of the Parish and its affairs.

k. Failure to implement in good faith any plan or arrangement agreed to by the Parish under this Canon.

Sec. 3. If a plan for restoring congregational health is not implemented in accordance with this Canon, the Bishop, with the concurrence of two-thirds of the Council of Trustees acting as Standing Committee of the Diocese, may require the application of one or more of the actions below, anything in the articles of incorporation or bylaws of such congregation notwithstanding. The actions shall be considered independent actions with no requirement of exhaustion of certain actions before the application of others.

a. A plan for the Parish to cure the conditions which led to the implementation of the inquiry, agreed to by the Parish within 90 days, and implemented thereafter in accordance with its terms.

b. Appointment by the Ecclesiastical Authority of five or more adult communicants temporarily to govern the affairs of the Parish as Warden and Vestry, notwithstanding any other canonical or other provision for such governance, until the Ecclesiastical Authority declares the end or sufficient amelioration of such conditions, or applies further measures under the Canons.

c. Designation of the Rector or the Parish Clergy-in-charge, until the Ecclesiastical Authority declares the end or sufficient amelioration of such conditions, or applies further measures under the Canons.

d. Conveyance of title of all real property of the Parish to the Diocese, which shall preserve and control such property in trust until the Ecclesiastical Authority declares the end or sufficient amelioration of such conditions, or applies further measures under the Canons.

e. Declaration of the parish as a non-self-governing parish, in writing, with the Bishop assuming rectorship.

f. Such other measures as the Ecclesiastical Authority shall determine with the advice and consent of two-thirds of the Council of Trustees acting as the Standing Committee of the Diocese until the Ecclesiastical Authority declares the end or sufficient amelioration of such conditions, or applies further measures under the Canons.

CANON IV.8

Of the Dissolution and Merging of Parishes

Sec. 1. The articles of incorporation of each parish shall provide that the Parish accedes to and is governed by the general Constitution and Canons of the Episcopal Church and the Constitution and Canons of this Diocese, including the provisions of this Canon IV.8.

Sec. 2. When a parish has ceased to function:

a. The Vestry, upon direction of the Bishop, with the advice and consent of the Council of Trustees in its role as the Standing Committee of the Diocese, shall take the necessary steps in accordance with state law to effect the dissolution of said corporation.

b. Upon the dissolution of such corporation, the title to all its property, real and personal, shall pass and be transferred and conveyed to The Episcopal Diocese of Kansas, Inc., a Kansas Corporation.

Sec. 3. The Bishop, with the advice and consent of the Council of Trustees in its role as the Standing Committee of the Diocese, may direct the vestries of two or more parishes to take such steps as are necessary in accordance with state laws to legally effect the merger into one parish corporation upon terms satisfactory to the respective parishes.

CANON IV.9

Of Filling a Vacant Cure

Sec. 1. When, in a self governing parish other than the Cathedral, a vacancy shall occur in the office of Rector, it shall be the duty of the Wardens to inform the Bishop without delay.

Sec. 2. Before a call is extended to any candidate concerning the vacancy, written approval shall be obtained from the Bishop and the Vestry shall submit such reports to the Bishop as the Bishop shall deem appropriate.

Sec. 3. Upon the nomination of a candidate to be the Rector of said Parish, the Vestry shall submit the name and terms to the Bishop who shall, without delay, certify approval or disapproval. If the Bishop disapproves, the Vestry shall proceed to another nomination.

Sec. 4. If an incorporated parochial Cure shall be vacant for an extended period of time, the Bishop, with the advice and consent of the Council of Trustees acting as the Standing Committee, may appoint a priest to serve as locum tenens. When a locum tenens is appointed, it shall be the duty of the parish to make provisions for such priest's or deacon's support as the Bishop may require, and to accord such priest all the rights and privileges of a Rector during the period of the appointment.

Sec. 5. If an incorporated parochial Cure shall be without a Rector, the Bishop may appoint a priest to serve as Interim Pastor or as Priest-in-Charge as those functions are defined in these Canons.

Sec. 6. Before the commencement of the tenure of any Pastor, the Bishop, the Pastor and the Parish acting through its Wardens and Vestry shall enter a Letter of Agreement defining the expectations and obligations of each of the parties setting such goals and objectives as may be appropriate and providing the terms under which the Pastor's tenure is defined.

CANON IV.10

Of the Use of Church Buildings

Church buildings, chapels, or houses of worship belonging to the Diocese or any parish, or institution of the church within the boundaries of the Diocese of Kansas may be opened for all services, rites, ceremonies or other purposes authorized or sanctioned by the Episcopal Church in the United States of America or by the Bishop, and for no other purpose, at such times as the priest-in-charge may deem proper or, if there be no priest-in-charge, as the Bishop having jurisdiction may direct.

CANON IV.11

Of the Parish Register and Parochial Reports

Sec. 1. Every priest or deacon in charge of a congregation, or the Warden of the same when there is no member of the clergy, shall keep a Parish Register and shall make the proper entries therein as required by the General Canons of the Church.

Sec. 2. Every priest or deacon in charge of a congregation, or the Warden of the same when there is no member of the clergy, shall prepare a full parochial report of the work of the congregation during the past year and of its present condition, according to the form furnished by the Secretary of Convention and shall submit the same to the Secretary by the thirtieth of January.

Sec. 3. The parochial reports rendered to the Secretary of Convention as General Canons provide shall be submitted by the Secretary to the Bishop by the first day of February.

CANON IV.12

Of Lay Employees

The Convention shall, by resolution or legislation, provide for a lay employees' pension plan in conformity with resolutions of the General Convention and the provisions of the Canons of the General Convention.

CANON IV.13
Of Campus Missions and Chaplaincies

Sec. 1.

a. At any institution of higher education in the Diocese of Kansas, the Diocese may establish a campus mission upon application of not less than ten persons, all actually students, faculty or staff of said institution. The manner and form of said application shall be prescribed by the Trustees.

b. Upon approval of an application under paragraph a. of this section by the Bishop and the Council of Trustees, the Bishop may designate a priest to serve as chaplain. The cost of providing a chaplain and programming for a campus mission shall be paid to the extent possible from funds provided through the operation of the campus mission when it is established and operating. The annual budget of the campus mission shall be approved as a part of the Diocesan budget by the annual Convention of the Diocese.

Sec. 2.

a. Each campus mission shall have a governing board of not less than seven, nor more than twelve, voting members, styled "the Bishop's Committee," and shall be appointed by the Bishop from persons nominated by the chaplain. Representation on the Bishop's Committee shall include full-time students of the university or college, members of the faculty or staff and (in the case of a campus mission with a communicant register) non-student communicants of the campus mission. Up to five representatives of local congregations may also be included as non-voting advisory members of the Bishop's Committee. All members of the Bishop's Committee shall be communicants in good standing in this church at least sixteen (16) years of age.

b. The organization and duties of the Bishop's Committee and its officers shall be those assigned by Canon IV.4 to vestries of unincorporated parishes and their officers.

Sec. 3. Each chaplain shall record in a standard register all official acts performed at the campus mission, as provided in these Canons. Communicants enrolled upon the register of a campus mission should be persons actually connected with the university or college as students, faculty or staff or their families. Communicants may be transferred to or received from another congregation in the manner prescribed by the General Canons for communicants moving from one congregation to another. Each chaplain shall seek to transfer any communicant permanently departing from the university or college community.

Sec. 4. In those academic communities in which college work is an ecumenical undertaking, the participation, financial support and personnel of the Diocese in such operation shall be that recommended by the Council of Trustees and approved by the Ecclesiastical Authority.

V - LEGISLATION

CANON V.1

Of Enactment, Amendment, and Repeal

New Canons may be enacted and existing Canons may be amended or repealed in whole or in part at any annual Diocesan Convention by a majority of both orders voting separately. Changes in these Canons become effective at the beginning of the calendar year following the Diocesan Convention at which said changes were approved, unless another date is specified in the motion to adopt.

Minutes of the 165th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Kansas October 18-19, 2024

Convention Theme: God's Path Together / Juntos en El Camino de Dios

The convention was called to order at 10:00 AM on Friday, October 18, 2024, by the Right Rev. Cathleen Bascom, 10th Bishop of Kansas and presider over the convention. After welcoming remarks and an overview of convention procedure by the Bishop, a short bilingual devotion was led by the Rev. Daniel Mafla (St. Paul's Kansas City) and Deacon Susan Byler (St. David's Topeka).

Mrs. Carolyn Sturgeon (St. Aidan's Olathe), Chair of the Committee on Dispatch of Business (DOB), moved the adoption of the convention agenda as updated and included in the registration packets. The motion was seconded and passed without further discussion.

The Minutes of the 164th Diocesan Convention were approved as reviewed by the Committee on Approval of the Minutes and published in the Journal of the 164th Annual Convention. (The Journal was published with the 2024 Diocesan Directory.)

Mrs. Sturgeon (DOB) moved the nomination of Dr. Kristi Baker-Lampe (St. David's Topeka) to serve as Secretary of the Convention. There being no further nominations from the floor and no further discussion, the Bishop declared Dr. Baker-Lampe elected to serve as Secretary.

The Secretary moved that, based on the report of the Registration Committee, roll call be dispensed with and a quorum be declared. Hearing no objections, the Bishop ordered the declaration of a quorum.

Mrs. Sturgeon (DOB) moved the adoption of Consent Calendar #1, which includes the Bishop's Episcopal appointments and nominations list, the Courtesy Resolution list, the Rules for Debate, and the designation of the Convention Eucharist Offering for the Episcopal Church in Navajoland in celebration of action by the General Convention to make Navajoland a missionary diocese and to draw attention to those often neglected by the wider church. The Bishop ordered the removal of two items from Consent Calendar #1 for amendment and emphasis following the adoption of the rest of the calendar: the appointment of the 166th Convention Committee on Dispatch of Business, the courtesy resolution sending greetings to the Rt. Rev. Richard F. Grein. Without further discussion, the remainder of Consent Calendar #1 was passed unanimously.

The Bishop amended the roster of the 166th Convention Committee on Dispatch of Business to include Ms. Kirsten Lee and thanked Ms. Lee for her willingness to serve.

The Bishop, considering the death of the Rt. Rev. Richard F. Grein (7th Bishop of Kansas) on October 8, 2024, amended Courtesy Resolution #7 on P. 28 of the Convention Book to send condolences to the family of the Rt. Rev. Richard F. Grein,

7th Bishop of Kansas. Following a brief video tribute to Bishop Grein, the Bishop moved the adoption of Courtesy Resolution #7 as amended. The motion passed unanimously.

Mrs. Sturgeon (DOB) moved the granting of seat and voice to the following non-canonically resident clergy present at the convention, having been designated by the Bishop as Collegial Members of Convention, along with clergy new to the diocese for whom Letters Dimissory have not yet been received:

- The Reverend Jody Carroll (Diocese of West Missouri) Grace Cathedral, Topeka
- The Reverend Dr. Micah Jackson (Diocese of Chicago) President of Bexley Seabury Seminary and Convention Guest
- The Right Reverend Daniel Genovesi (Interim Bishop resigned, Anglican Church of Uruguay) Rector-elect, St. Andrews Emporia and Multicultural Consultant for the Episcopal Diocese of Kansas
- The Right Reverend Douglas Sparks (Ninth Bishop, Diocese of Northern Indiana) Convention Guest and Preacher

There being no further discussion, the motion unanimously.

Mr. Jay Curry (Diocesan Comptroller) reported that there are NO PARISHES DELINQUENT in their apportionment for 2023. His report was met with thunderous applause from the voting body.

The Bishop gave her Convention Address, which incorporated short presentations by members of the Diocesan Strategic Planning Group as follows:

- Objective 1, Congregational Vitality – The Rev. Casey Rohleder
- Objective 2, Culture of Justice and Inclusion – The Rev. Doreen Rice-Daab
- Objective 3, Youth and Young Adult Connections – Ms. Teresa Ryther
- Objective 4, Nourish Leadership – Mr. Mike Morrow

After a fifteen-minute break, in which delegates were encouraged to visit with each of these speakers about their presented objectives, the speakers briefly summarized their individual conversations for the convention.

A video introduction of the Diocesan Staff was presented.

The Bishop announced the formation of the Youth and Young Adult Task Force, convened by the Rev. Kelly Demo, and the Architecture and Allied Arts Commission, convened by Christine Lipscomb. (During the Convention Eucharist on Saturday morning, the Bishop also announced the re-launching of the Liturgy, Music, and the Arts, convened by Dr. Kristi Baker-Lampe.) The Bishop also called upon anyone present who felt so called to consider joining one of these important ministries.

The Bishop introduced the four Convocation Deans and all of the Minster Shepherds.

The Bishop introduced the Rev. Daniel Mafra (from Colombia), new rector at St. Paul's Kansas City and the first bilingual priest in the Diocese of Kansas. She then introduced the Right Rev. Daniel Genovese (originally from Argentina), the rector-elect at St. Andrew's Emporia and newly appointed Multicultural Consultant, who said a few words to the Convention Delegates.

Noonday Prayer was led by the Rev. Margaret McGhee.
The Convention took a 60-minute recess for lunch.

The Bishop gavelled the convention back to order at 1:30 PM.

The Reverend Canon Patrick Funston (Canon to the Ordinary) and Deacon Fran Wheeler (St. Thomas Overland Park) presented the first two of seven Alleluia Grants given this year. The remaining five grants were awarded throughout the afternoon's business session. Deacon Wheeler noted that more than \$114,000.00 in Alleluia Grants have been awarded to date. This year's Alleluia Grants were as follows:

- St. Francis Ministries – for a prayer and meditation garden
- St. Paul's Kansas City – for their walkway and garden project
- Covenant Junction City – for vegetable garden & prayer/meditation garden
- Grace Cathedral Topeka – for “Increasing Nutritional Benefits to our Neighbors”
- St. Stephens Wichita – for installation of a keycard entry system
- St. Luke's Wamego – for supplying their little free pantry and adding a little free library
- St. Thomas Overland Park – for expansion of their Immigration Ministry

Mr. Brian Geary (St. Thomas Overland Park), Diocesan Treasurer, introduced and moved the adoption of the 2025 Diocesan Mission Plan. After a brief discussion, the motion passed unanimously.

The Treasurer then moved the adoption of the 2025 Apportionment Schedule as amended by the Trustees to allow for errors found in two previous parochial reports (those of Trinity Lawrence and Calvary Yates Center) and included in Convention Registration materials. The motion passed without discussion.

Canon Lisa Senuta gave an introduction and overview of the ongoing work of creating and supporting an intentional spiritual community, The Bethany Community of Saints Martha, Mary, and Lazarus. Detailed information about this community was included in the Convention Registration materials. Canon Senuta noted that the community has doubled in size since its inception.

The Reverend Oliver Bunker, Chair of the Committee on Debatable Resolutions, introduced and moved the adoption of Debatable Resolution #1, which requests the initiation of a three-year campaign to create an endowment fund for the express purpose of providing scholarship money to diocesan youth for attending Camp.

The Rev. Kelly Demo clarified the specific objectives outlined in the resolution and the rationale behind it. With no further discussion coming from the floor, the motion passed unanimously.

The convention was treated to a video introduction to its Youth and Young Adult Delegation.

A video followed, which contained information and introductions to clergy who have changed orders or transitioned to a new ministry since the last convention.

General Convention Deputies Kirsten Lee, Stephen Mann, and the Very Rev. Torey Lightcap gave a brief presentation on the recent General Convention. More detailed information on the convention was included in the Convention Registration materials.

Mr. Hurst Coffman, Vice-chancellor of the Diocese and member of the Committee on Constitution and Canons, presented for the second reading of Constitutional Amendment 1, and moved its adoption. The amendment to Article VI would simplify the procedure for selecting Deputies to the General Convention. A favorable vote on the second reading would cause the amendment to go into effect. The Rev. Canon Patrick Funston spoke to the amendment, explaining the need to streamline this process. There being no further discussion from the floor, the amendment passed in a vote by orders.

The Very Reverend Laurie Lewis (St. Stephens, Wichita), Dean of the Southwest Convocation and Chair of the Committee on Nominations and Elections introduced the slates of nominees for election to the Council of Trustees. As each nominee was running unopposed for their respective position and no other nominations were made from the floor, the Bishop declared each nominee, in turn, elected to their respective position as follows:

- Deacon Carl Edwards – Clergy at-large (3-year term)
- Dr. Elizabeth Fitz Gibbon – Lay at-large (3-year term)
- Mr. Mason Weber – Lay at-large (remaining 2 years of an unexpired term)

Dean Lewis introduced the three nominees for three open lay positions on the Disciplinary Board. With no further nominations made from the floor, the Bishop declared the nominees elected, as follows:

- Ms. Jan Boyle – 3-year term
- Mr. Barry Carroll – 3-year term
- Ms. Julia Hart – 3-year term

Dean Lewis introduced the four nominees for the four open clergy positions on the Disciplinary Board. With no further nominations made from the floor, the Bishop declared the nominees elected as follows:

- The Rev. Christine Gilson – 3-year term
- The Very Rev. Torey Lightcap – 3-year term
- The Rev. Kevin Schmidt – 3-year term
- The Rev. Kitty Shield – 3-year term

The Bishop recognized and thanked the Very Rev. Casey Rohleder, who retired from the Council of Trustees after serving two consecutive 3-year terms, and who served as Council President from November 2019 to October 2022.

Dr. Baker-Lampe (Secretary) reported that no actions have been taken by the Standing Committee, acting as the Ecclesiastical Authority, since the last Annual Convention.

Mrs. Sturgeon (DOB) moved the adoption of Consent Calendar #2, which includes receipt of the 2023 Reports of Committees, Commissions, and Institutions that were included in the 2024 Diocesan Directory and Journal of the 164th Diocesan Convention. The motion passed without further discussion.

Canon Funston made a few housekeeping announcements, and at 3:30 PM, the Bishop declared the convention in recess until Saturday morning's Convention Eucharist.

The Bishop called the convention back to order at 9:30 AM on Saturday, October 19, 2024 for Convention Holy Eucharist. The first bilingual Convention Eucharist in the history of the Diocese of Kansas, the service included readings, congregational hymns, and prayers in both English and Spanish. Special music in both languages provided by mariachi musicians from St. Paul's Kansas City, and by an 18-voice choir comprised of local singers and convention delegates. The choir was organized and accompanied by Dakota Bennet (St. James Wichita) and directed by Dr. Kristi Baker-Lampe (St. David's Topeka). A short recess followed the service.

The Bishop gaveled the convention back to order at 11:00 AM. She thanked all the participants in the Holy Eucharist for creating a beautiful and memorable service.

Dr. Baker-Lampe (Secretary) reported no further business to come before the convention.

The Bishop and Canon Funston conducted a commissioning service for all current and newly elected or appointed officials of the diocese.

Archdeacon Jeff Roper and Bishop Daniel Genovese led closing and sending prayers, followed by the singing of "We Are Marching in the Light of God" in both English and Spanish.

The Bishop declared the 165th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Kansas adjourned, sine die at 11:45 AM.

The 166th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Kansas will be held on Friday and Saturday, October 24-25, 2025, at the Doubletree Hotel in Overland Park, Kansas.

Appendix A

Proposed Rules of Debate

1. Whenever possible, speakers will be called in alternating order of their positions on the issue under consideration.
2. Speakers will be limited to two (2) minutes on an issue under consideration, except that:
 - a) A speaker may speak again to any amendment, with a two (2) minute time limit again applying; and
 - b) A speaker may answer questions of information.
3. While motions to call the previous question (close debate), limit debate, postpone to a set time, postpone indefinitely or commit are acceptable at any time, the motion will be effective **only** after all speakers already at the microphone have had an opportunity to speak.
4. Items such as courtesy resolutions may be placed on a consent calendar to be voted as a group.
 - a) The consent calendar(s) shall be prepared by the Committee on Dispatch of Business and distributed to the Convention.
 - b) The consent calendar is not subject to debate.
 - c) An item or items may be removed from the consent calendar at the request of any delegate, providing that at least two other delegates join the request. The removal of one or more items from the consent calendar is not subject to a vote.
 - d) Items so removed shall be voted upon separately and are subject to debate.

Explanation:

A convention is a gathering of the community of the church in this place.

Communities that are

functional listen to one another and give each person an opportunity to speak. These proposed rules of debate are designed to advance our life at this “community reunion.”

Some items will be judged by the Committee on Dispatch of Business to be items on which delegates are in full agreement. These items, such as courtesy resolutions, will be placed on a consent calendar. However, should a delegate feel that an item deserves either debate or comment, that item may be removed from the consent calendar as provided for above.

In all our discussions, we seek to know Christ and to make Christ known.

Appendix G Constitutional Amendments

Note: Language to be removed is in ~~strikethrough~~; language to be added is in *italics*.

Changes to the diocesan constitution require adoption at two consecutive conventions via a vote by orders (clergy and lay delegates voting separately). This constitutional amendment is presented for its first reading.

Constitutional amendment 1

Proposed by the Rev. Canon A. Patrick Funston

ARTICLE VI

Deputies to the General Convention and to the Provincial Synod

Sec. 1. At the annual meeting of the Diocesan Convention next preceding the deadline for certification of deputies to each General Convention, the Convention shall elect, *in a manner adopted by the Council of Trustees*, by a majority vote four clergy and four lay persons as deputies ~~and a like number of provisional deputies~~ to represent the Diocese in the General Convention *and the Provincial Synod*. *The Convention shall elect from the remaining nominees four clergy and four lay persons as alternate deputies.* Clerical deputies shall be members of this Convention. Lay deputies shall be adult communicants in good standing within the Diocese. ~~Provisional~~ *Alternate* deputies shall serve as necessary according to the order of their election.

Sec. 2. The deputies and ~~provisional~~ *alternate* deputies elected to represent the Diocese in the General Convention shall serve as ~~deputies and provisional deputies~~ to the Provincial Synod until the election of their successors. *If fewer than four of an order's elected deputies or alternate deputies are able to attend a meeting of the General Convention or the Provincial Synod, the Ecclesiastical Authority may at any time appoint additional provisional alternate deputies to ensure full representation from the Diocese in the General Convention in the event neither the elected deputies nor the elected provisional deputies are able to attend.*

Sec. 3. Deputies shall be elected as required by General Canon. Upon the election of an appropriate number of deputies, all nominees not elected shall be listed on a

single ballot for the purpose of selecting provisional deputies who may be elected by plurality vote.

Explanation: Every three years, the Diocesan Convention elects General Convention (and Provincial Synod) deputies. These elections currently require a majority vote, so each deputy must reach the requisite 50%+1 threshold independently. This process takes multiple rounds of voting. Removing ‘by majority vote’ allows the adoption of an alternate method of balloting such as single-ballot rank choice or some other form. The determination of methodology is given to the Council of Trustees.

“Provisional deputy,” being archaic, is amended throughout to “alternate deputy,” the classification used by General Convention and its canons.

Further, language is modified or moved to clarify that the triennial election is for deputies to both the General Convention and the Provincial Synod.

Explanation (continued): Amendments to Section 2 clarify the purpose and manner of appointment of non-elected alternate deputies.

Section 3 is entirely removed due to superfluity: the diocese is always required to follow General Canon. Moreover, Article I, Section 4 of the Constitution of the General Convention states that each diocese “shall prescribe the manner in which its Deputies shall be chosen,” which this Article does. The final sentence’s language about the election of alternate deputies has been moved into Section 1.

A word about timing: This amendment has been a priority of the Canon to the Ordinary for a number of years, but was held until this convention to avoid confusion should one of its readings coincide with a deputy election. Having been adopted by the 164th Convention, it returns for its second reading at this 165th Convention. Adoption by this Convention would cause the constitution to be amended effective January 1, 2025. Having last been elected in 2022, General Convention deputies will next be elected in 2025 at the 166th Convention. Should the amendment be adopted on this second reading, the next deputy election would take place under its articulation.

Due to the level of complexity in this amendment, the amended article, if ultimately adopted, is reproduced here:

ARTICLE VI

Deputies to the General Convention and to the Provincial Synod

Sec. 1. At the annual meeting of the Diocesan Convention next preceding the deadline for certification of deputies to each General Convention, the Convention shall elect, in a manner adopted by the Council of Trustees, four clergy and four lay persons as deputies to represent the Diocese in the General Convention and the Provincial Synod. The Convention shall elect from the remaining nominees four clergy and four lay persons

as alternate deputies. Clerical deputies shall be members of this Convention. Lay deputies shall be adult communicants in good standing within the Diocese. Alternate deputies shall serve as necessary according to the order of their election.

Sec. 2. The deputies and alternate deputies shall serve until the election of their successors. If fewer than four of an order's elected deputies or alternate deputies are able to attend a meeting of the General Convention or the Provincial Synod, the Ecclesiastical Authority may at any time appoint additional alternate deputies to ensure full representation from the Diocese.

Appendix H

Bishop's Address

Does anyone know our convention theme? Please come to a microphone and say it out loud, both in English and Spanish. Now let's practice saying it together in Spanish. "Juntos en el Camino de Dios."

Thank you to Director of Communications Chad Senuta for putting together this beautiful logo, which you see here on the screens, to represent our theme.

As we gather this weekend for our 165th Diocesan Convention, I want to focus on this theme in this address. We'll also keep saying it as you travel back to your places, hoping you will say it as you move out from your parishes into your neighborhoods to speak of God's path that we are on together, Juntos en el camino de Dios.

We are going to be blessed with some amazing music. And if any of you are in this room who are musicians who will be serving in that capacity over the next 24 hours, stand up just for a minute. (Applause) And more to come. We know that there is an ensemble coming from Kansas City from St. Paul's, Kansas City, KS will also be leading with us. So there will be exquisite music, glorious music, but I hope that you will indulge me for a minute musically. As I was thinking about our theme and getting ready for this address, a song by George Harrison kept playing in my brain. Some will know that he's a near Saint to me, a lesser Saint. So Saint George kept running through my brain. There are some lyrics for the song "Any Road." Find them on your table.

If you don't know where you're going, any road will take you there. If you look at the bottom of this sheet of lyrics, George Harrison was a master at sneaking holy words about the divine God into pop songs. He sneaks in there his spirituality "Bow to God and call God Sir." He's implying that this is the key to knowing where you are going. That's why we are seeking to be on God's path together. We have many names for the experiences that we have of the risen one who comes among us. Different names, different titles, and different analogies for this holy mystery. And one of mine is Jesus as a trailblazer. When I was growing up in Colorado in the 1960s and 70s, I was a somewhat inconsistent and ambivalent Girl Scout. But I was an avid camper and trailblazer. My mother, this was her one role in the scouting troop. She would lose her dress and pearls and put on her jeans and her moccasins and teach us camp craft and trailblazing, which she had learned around Topeka, Kansas, as a girl when Burnett's mound was still rich with arrowheads.

So she would take us into the Rockies and choose different areas to explore: the Aspen Grove, the Wildflower Valley, and the summit. In trail blazing, a wise person who knows the terrain well goes ahead, and they build small Cairns out of rocks or make arrows from sticks, or, for the more advanced, even kind of bend a branch and point it down a path. So, certain numbers of stones we learned, you could see it in the little Girl Scout manual, right, like they're stacked 3 on top that that meant one thing. If there was a stone kind of pointing another way, those things were codes. You're on the right track. Keep going. Or turn off, turn right. Stop! Danger!

In our case, a small band of fervent but giggly girls who try to follow the laid-out path, make the right turns, not stumble into the forest or, worse yet, over some granite ledge. And we usually would end up at a feast with some adults there or older scouts waiting with baked potatoes baked in the fire, or something we called singing oranges. It's like, I think you take an orange, and you kind of pound it, and you stick a peppermint straw in there. So a kind of messianic banquet.

One trail-blazing moment is kind of seared into my memory because we lost Lisa Yorker. Even though her father had been a skiing spy in World War 2. He slid on skis across the German lines in Norway. I would go to her house, and his skis hung above the fireplace as a trophy. But Lisa was not a good trekker. She was very talkative, and that says a lot if I say that. She talked all the time. She was highly distracted. And this one time, she just kept tying, we had these high-top Converse, you know, which were the rage. And she kept tying them and tying them and giggling and talking about weird stuff, you know. And we got impatient. So we charged on, and this is probably five girls or something like that. We left. We left Lisa, figuring she'd find us. She got lost for an hour or two. I can only imagine. I don't remember, but I can only imagine what my mother must have felt. If you're nine years old, and you get lost near the Rocky Mountain National Park. Or you're a friend and you've lost your friend and you're 9, you're the National Park, it was no joke. But after that we always remembered the importance of staying together, of working with one another, of waiting for one another. That's why our theme is "God's Path Together." "Juntos" right? Is that the together bit? "Juntos en el Camino de Dios."

There are scriptural roads. After the crucifixion of Jesus, two of his disciples, Cleopas, and an unnamed companion, we think it might have been his wife. That's my feminist reading because she wasn't named, of course. They had an experience of Jesus as a trailblazer on the road to Emmaus. Jesus, the risen Christ, mysteriously accompanied them, and he laid out a course for them and for all future disciples. Central to the Emmaus story are the holy scriptures, like a set of stones built into a Cairn, the risen one laid one holy text upon another, building a Cairn pointing them into the way of love. Isn't this true for us today? On this journey of life, prayerful reading of scripture makes texts light up, and it brings us direction still now to find our way.

On that road, the disciples broke bread with the trailblazer. The sacramental meal was like a clear arrow pointing them into communion with God. The cairns of scripture and the arrows of Eucharist opened their eyes to Christ's presence and made their hearts burn. Another trailblazer story, I think, happened with a guy on a highway to Damascus. It was probably a big road, though, kind of steep, right? Saul, to become

the apostle Paul, was on the road to persecuting Christians in Damascus. He set off with a very different agenda. Rather specific, but a blinding light and the voice of the risen Christ were like two crossed branches on the path. The code was clear. Stop! And they literally stopped him blind. So, his body goes on to Damascus, but his soul abruptly changes course to follow Jesus and Jesus' way of love.

An important element of both these stories, I think, is crucial but may be overlooked, and that is the place of suffering. On the road to Emmaus, after all, the two people who walked were in a state of trauma. And Jesus's crucifixion, they had experienced betrayal, corruption, and violence, the ugliness of humanity, and they felt that God had abandoned them. There is all the poignant, wistful, bewildered regret in the world in their sorrowing words. "We were hoping that he was the one who was going to rescue Israel."

But then the reason Jesus walked with them and the meaning of it all became clear, and the darkness became light. And on that road to Damascus, Saul is himself caught up in human ugliness. Some commentators believe that Paul's frenzy arose because he could not fathom how these new Christians faced peril and suffering with such peace, with such serenity. He, after all, had witnessed Steven, the first Deacon, being stoned, and the scripture says Stephen sort of glowed with his peace. I would say that amongst all the beloved religions of the world, Christianity compellingly addresses the reality of suffering. In these road stories, Jesus the Trailblazer shows us that human suffering is, or can be, an arrow, a way into the transforming love of God.

I am, by nature, perhaps one of the more optimistic people on the planet, and yet even I can see that suffering is plenty. Since last year, the war between Ukraine and Russia has not ended. The brutal conflict in Sudan has not stopped. Trouble brews in parts of South and Central America, in our own streets, and in our own political world. And now the Middle East is roiling with atrocities and war that radiates ever further and further. Now, forest fires in the Western US are like annual events. And we've had the double whammy of the hurricanes in Florida and North Carolina. Suffering is with us, friends. Even if the green Eden of Kansas is a little bit protected.

And yet, we have the holy mystery of a trailblazer. If any of this makes you anxious, just know that there is one who is present with us, who will be present with us, who doesn't deny suffering, and yet carries us in it and through it, to be changed and to know the love of God, which is the beginning and the end, the foundation of all that is. I want to give a shout-out to our Canons. Lisa Senuta. Is she here somewhere? There's a little sheet that shows how she has been walking many roads to visit you in your parishes, in your places. She goes around the diocese and teaches us how to pray, reminds us how to meditate, that we get in touch with the trailblazer who wants to be with us and who will lead us through everything, our joys and our glories, and our sufferings.

And shout-out to Canon Patrick Funston, right here, who is with you on the phone regularly, taking all these calls of the clergy. Taking all these questions of the vestries, the wardens, and the treasurers. All those go to Jay, sorry. Then we have our Missioner, Karen, who walks with all our younger people so beautifully gathered at camp every summer, and then all along the year as they go through their joys and their sufferings. And it goes on and on.

I want to turn to our Strategic Plan. What parts of the mountain is God calling the Episcopal Diocese of Kansas to go up? Right? Are we going into wildflower fields, you know? We are called to ascend, to do the work, to go on the journey on God's path together. And your Council of Trustees has been working hard to listen to Jesus, the trailblazer. Where are we supposed to be going? And if you are a member of the Diocesan Council of Trustees, I ask you now to rise so that these people can give you our thanks, please. (Applause) This is one of the most engaged, gifted boards you can't imagine. And they've outlined for us, as you've heard last convention, four parts of the mountain or the Prairie, we all know I love the prairie more. Four areas where we think God wants us to go and where our priorities need to be: Congregational Vitality, Justice and Inclusion, Youth and Young Adult Connections, and Clergy and Lay Leadership.

There they are. I bet that rose window, that Venn diagram, you should be getting used to that. We keep trying to carry it to you everywhere, and the last convention put these areas out there, remember, and people took time at the convention to go and talk to these leaders. And then all year, they've been working. The gifted staff have been working. I have been working and thinking as we say, "Well, how, how, how?" Right? Well, bishop, yeah, that's a great picture. How, how, how, how in the world are we going to do any of this? How are we going to move forward in these areas?

This year, we're bringing before you an implementation plan. I'm so sad to say that our great champion of strategic planning, Dr. Beth Fitz Gibbon, who is president of the Council of Trustees, is ill. She could not be here to kick us off. But in her stead, to roll out our implementation plan to you, it is my pleasure to call forward a member of our executive committee, Mother Doreen Rice, to introduce the Council of Trustees Strategic Implementation Plan.

Mother Doreen Rice - Hi everybody. It sounds a little lengthier than I had prepped for. So, the implementation plan is going to mirror what we did a couple of years ago with the entire diocese, which is to involve everyone's voices in our work going forward. So, to do that, right now today, we are going to have four stations set up with representatives from these subgroups that we've worked on that the bishop just mentioned: Congregational Vitality, Justice and Inclusion, Youth and Young Adult Connections, and then Clergy and Lay Leadership. Representatives from those four groups are going to speak briefly about where we are in that work, where the Holy Spirit is calling us in that work, and, most importantly, we are now ready to engage the rest of the diocese with people in that work beyond the Council of Trustees. So we want you to talk with us after we speak briefly and then, most importantly, ask questions and sign up to help be a part of the ultimate implementation.

Congregational Vitality, Mother Casey Rohleder will speak about that briefly and answer questions. I will talk about Justice and Inclusion, Teresa Ryther will talk about Youth and Young Adult Connections, and then Mike Morrow will talk about Clergy and Lay Leadership. And I also encourage you to go through your folder and find a document that looks like this. And the first page says Congregational Vitality. Each of our four groups rolled out kind of an outline of where we are, where we are going, and our goal. So, to refer to this, too. It's got a lot of great info. See Mother Casey next to

the green poster. And there's a mauve poster there. So, we will start with Mother Casey talking about Congregational Vitality.

Mother Casey Rohleder - Good morning, everyone. It's great to stand before you again this year. There are a lot of things that fall under this goal to strengthen congregational vitality amid a changing world. As you see, there are 7-8 check marks up there, but before we can start having congregations strengthen vitality, we need to have a common understanding of what vitality means. So, you'll see on this page that we need to speak the same language. And that is going to be an important piece of our work for the next year. People who are willing to come together to look at the research, look at resources, to come up with a common language of what it means to be vital regardless of context in this day and age. And that's where I know the Council of Trustees is looking for conversation and engagement, and a few hardy souls to become part of a task force. Another really exciting piece, but it's not on the shortlist here, is to establish four new model Episcopal communities by 2030. So, how do we expand our understanding of what community looks like as we pray, worship, study, and reach out to the communities we serve? So that one is not on the shortlist, but I want to point that out because it's quite important. Also, the diocese is going to be doing some work with the College for Congregational Development to help provide us with the resources and training. Because the resources are out there. We don't need to reinvent things. But please come to us, and let's have some conversations around congregational vitality, particularly if you would like to consider putting your name forward for the task force. Thank you.

Mother Doreen Rice - Thank you, Mother Casey. So, Justice and Inclusion, Invitation and Welcome is another phrase that we've used for a couple of years. It is essentially about how we reach out to beloved siblings in our neighborhoods and then how we welcome them into the love and grace that we find in each of our parishes. So specifically, we have talked about sharing resolutions from General Convention with the diocese that relate, especially to respecting the dignity of every human being. We've talked about how we continue the work at Bethany Place, a new Episcopal community to welcome the neighborhood. We are also so excited and supportive of the bilingual ministries going on in the diocese that we experienced this morning. And then we just want to continue to reach out to the neighborhood. We want them to experience what we all experience in our parishes and our unique contexts. So I also like my Casey invite you to consider being a part of the group, you know, really, how do we share God's love? It's kind of a beautiful conversation to continually have.

Bishop Cathleen Bascom - Just a real quick comment on her last remark. We had a vibrant Justice and Racial Reconciliation Task Force early after I became Bishop. And then COVID and some other matters kind of slowed it down. But so that those of you who served on that, we hope that we can fold gifted members from that group who are still passionate about this into newer work and the new task force that will be emerging. So, I just want to highlight that. So now we turn it over to Teresa.

Teresa Ryther - In our Youth and Young Adults Strategic Plan, we have developed a very thoughtful objective to direct connections to loving communities where youth and young adults can feel safe. Where they can experience God's grace and

create lifelong spiritual curiosity. And we have already formed our task force, and the Reverend Kelly Demo, who is right here at the back, is the leader of that. And we want to create relationship-building opportunities for our youth. We are also very excited about ensuring the health of our youth and campus ministries through an endowment. I was just told a little while ago that a group in the northwest has already deemed some monies that will be donated to that endowment. That was told to me just a few minutes ago. We want to help youth and young adults discern their God-given gifts and how they can serve and develop Episcopal and Ecumenical partners for fostering growth with youth and young adults. So please come over and visit with us during the break and sign up for the things you might be interested in helping with.

Mike Morrow - Good morning, everyone. I'm going to be talking about Clergy and Lay leadership. How many of you, just by a show of hands, remember the Lay Leadership Academy we used to have? Well, it's coming back. But we're going to be doing some things very differently, especially with the technological resources we have. We're going to start by doing a lot of things online, and one of the first things we had to do was come up with job descriptions. I mean, for those of you who've had to recruit people to be wardens, vestry members, delegates, etc. You go up to somebody and say, "Hey, do you want to be a delegate to convocation and convention," and the first question is, well, what do you do? What does this job entail? So, I've already prepared a nine-to-10-page list of definitions, which my fellow committee members get to go through, but to put this information online. So when you're asking people, "Do you want to be a Junior Warden, Well, what does the Junior Warden do? And so, we're putting that information together, and we're going to provide information through videos, shared resources, online information, and also in-person training both at the diocesan and convocation or regional levels. And regularly communicate what is available online and in person.

Another issue we're going to be addressing is compensation and benefits. Sadly, the last guidelines on clergy compensation were done back in 2007, as far as minimum standards, they are a little out of date today. So, we're going to be updating the guidelines on the compensation and benefits for clergy and lay staff. We're also going to include bivocational clergy. The 2007 guidelines were just full-time folks. And probably no more of this non-stipendiary stuff. Clergy need to be compensated. Also, increased curacy support will be part of this conversation. Again, those guidelines go back to 2007. Curates cannot live on that guideline today. It needs to be updated.

Finally, we're going to be dealing with Clergy Leadership, wellness, and support. Those include Thresholds in Leadership, which is a clergy program for people who've been called for a new job. clergy coaching, which the retired Bishop of Iowa, Bishop Scarf, is now doing for newly ordained clergy. Diocesan support for supply clergy for those who are ordained on staff, providing parishes free-of-charge coverage when that priest is not available at that parish. Increased training for Communion in the Absence of a Priest, so that there is more flexibility if you cannot have a priest there on Sunday. Also, ongoing retired clergy support led by Chaplain to Retired Clergy Shawn Streepy, with support from Canon Pastor George Wiley. Finally, ongoing support for active clergy led by Canons Patrick Funston and Lisa Senuta. So, if you have any interest in any of this, let us know and come by. We'll be happy to visit with you. Thank you.

Bishop Cathleen Bascom - Thank you to all four of you. I hope that you might see these things that are named on the posters that you have in your list as kind of cairns or arrows pointing out a direction. We understand that you have your small band or larger band, depending on the size of your parish, wherever you live. And you must make Incarnate these diocesan pointers where we think Christ is leading us as the body of Christ in the Eastern part of Kansas. And so, engage them, reach out to us for resources related to these directions, and then figure out how you need to live them. You are the ones who know how to bear the gospel in your place. But we, as your leaders, are trying to do our best to provide some guidance for this life together. What is our motto?

I'm going to ask Mother Laurie Lewis to stand at that microphone. And Father Daniel, will you stand at that microphone? Now, in concert with Dean Lewis, let's say our English motto. Ready, 123 together. God's Path Together. OK, and in Spanish, everybody. *Juntos en el Camino de Dios*. So, I would ask that we play George Harrison one more time, and as we sing the last few stanzas, we invite you to take a break. And these leaders are going to be staying at their posters. You're invited to come to ask them questions, learn more, and offer your services. We will return after the break for the plenary session. See you back here in half an hour.

2024 Annual Reports

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Diocesan Ministries

Bethany House & Garden

Characteristic of all good gardens, The Bethany House and Garden ministry continued to grow and evolve in 2024. A summary of our activities over the last year:

We welcomed intern Marley Hays in January, and she served the ministry through July before departing to begin a master's program in English at the University of Virginia. Marley was instrumental in the completion of our Creation Care grant, which will fund the establishment of the first of the new Episcopal Eco-Regions, The Episcopal Grasslands Network. Marley also assisted with Spanish language translation as we welcomed new Latino clergy to our diocese, and she helped grow connections with several partner organizations in our immediate community and across the state.

2024 was our first year participating in Kansas WEALTH Day, an annual event focused on environmental advocacy and education, bringing together organizations, advocates, and legislators to discuss and address issues related to Water, Energy, Air, Land, Transportation, and Health. It was a great opportunity for us to connect with other organizations engaged in environmental stewardship work across the state and expanded our capacity to serve as a connection and resource for Episcopal Creation Care sites around the diocese.

In June, our head gardener Willie Madl and his wife Katelynn traveled to Kenya to visit the farm at Agatha Amani House and trade garden wisdom. Coincidentally, we grow many of the same vegetables here in Topeka as they do halfway across the globe on a farm in the Great Rift Valley!

We had a very productive summer in the garden and brought fresh vegetables to the food pantries at Westside Baptist and St. David's from May through October. It is wonderful to be able to supply healthy, organically grown food to our neighbors and to help alleviate food insecurity in our community.

In July, we hosted the clergy retreat for the Southeast Convocation. Our clergy colleagues enjoyed some peaceful time in the gardens and heard a presentation on the history of St. Simon's, from the founding of the parish in the late 1800s, to the painful impact of its closing as part of de-segregation measures in 1964, to the dedication of our new outdoor chapel in honor and memory of that faithful congregation.

Beginning in August, we partnered with Meadows Elementary for a second year of our Monarchs at Meadows program. A total of 20 classrooms each raised a clutch of 10 monarch caterpillars, monitoring their growth and metamorphosis from 1cm caterpillars to fully fledged butterflies. We were especially grateful for our Creation Care Task Force members and Creation Care Trustees who assisted in supplying us with enough milkweed to keep our caterpillars fed! This has been such a joyful project for the past two years, helping the children of our community understand the positive impact they can have on their environment, both locally and globally.

Partnering with the community of Grace Cathedral, we have been fundraising to install a labyrinth here in the garden and we are very excited to have reached our financial goal. The labyrinth is an ancient meditation tool used by many cultures and faith traditions around the world and has been used by Christian communities for hundreds

of years. Our labyrinth will be installed in the center of the existing prairie garden, and we plan to begin construction in the Spring of 2025.

We continue to enjoy the dedication and hard work of our incredible garden volunteers who meet each week to help bring to fruition our vision for this space.

Board of Examining Chaplains

Under the authority of the Bishop of Kansas and in mutual ministry with the Commission on Ministry and the Council of Trustees, the diocesan Board of Examining Chaplains (BoEC) has continued to serve the Diocese of Kansas and the Episcopal Church. The BoEC acts in a supportive role in the academic preparation of ordination candidates, particularly by assisting presbyteral candidates taking the General Ordination Exams. The Board meets as needed, usually online, with meetings concentrated in the spring following the year's General Ordination Exam results.

In 2024, the Board continued its practice of working with presbyteral ordination candidates, the Commission on Ministry, and the Bishop. In particular, the Board provided feedback and suggested remediation for candidates who received one or more “non-proficient” scores on their General Ordination Exams. The board examined the candidates exam responses along with the comments provided by the graders of the national exam. We provided assignments meant to aid the candidate’s knowledge, understanding, and future ministry. The work of the board with presbyteral candidates is confidential—hence, the lack of new details in this report from year to year!

As always, the board continues to collaborate effectively and collegially. Currently, the board is made up of Mr. Mike Morrow, Rev. Dr. Rob Schwaller, Rev. Doreen Rice Daab, and myself. I am grateful for the time and thoughtfulness provided by each member of the board and for the support of the Bishop and the Commission on Ministry.

Commission on Ministry

In 2024, the Commission on Ministry of the Diocese of Kansas met March 1-2 and April 27 to interview Nominees for postulancy. The Commission also hosted two discernment retreats in 2024. “Discernment Day” at St. Andrew’s, Emporia on May 4, and “Discerning God’s Call,” held at Upton Hall, Topeka on August 23 -25.

There are 16 people in the process as Nominees, Postulants or Candidates for ordination. There are 8 students currently enrolled at the Bishop Kemper School for Ministry, our local formation program for deacons and priests. Also, there are 2 students enrolled in residential seminaries and 2 additional students who plan to enroll in residential programs in the fall.

The Convocational Discernment Committees entered their twelfth year of ministry working with Nominees to further discern and articulate their sense of call. Each of the four convocations met with at least 1 Nominee in 2024. The committees continue to be supported in their work by the Canon for Spiritual Life & Clergy Care. There are currently 4 people in convocational discernment.

The Commission recommended 4 people for candidacy in 2024. The bishop ordained 2 to the vocational diaconate, 3 to the transitional diaconate, and 3 to the priesthood.

The Commission appreciates sharing with the bishop the work of recruiting, discerning, and forming people for ministry, both lay and ordained. The Chair thanks the Canon to the Ordinary and the diocese's Director of Operations—who advise and administer the work of the Commission—for their outstanding support this year!

Council of Trustees

The Council of Trustees met monthly on Zoom, with occasional in-person retreats at Bethany House on the grounds of Grace Episcopal Cathedral in Topeka. The Diocese serves 44 parishes and 8500 members over the Eastern and Central 40% of the state. It includes diverse metro areas such as Topeka, Wichita and Kansas City, as well as small rural towns with populations of less than 1,000. Its diversity includes multicultural and Hispanic ministries.

Throughout 2024 the Council continued its strategic planning process based on the 2022-23 primary research "listening project" which included one-on-one interviews, a diocesan-wide confidential online survey, and on-line and in-person focus groups with clergy, Minister Shepherds and regional Convocation Representatives. The Diocesan Strategic Plan was introduced to the Diocese at the 2024 Annual Convention. Four priority areas were presented: Congregational Vitality, Justice, Welcome & Inclusion, Youth & Young Adults, and Clergy & Lay Leadership. Each priority is supported by a Task Force consisting of lay leaders, clergy, Council members and parishioners. Their work will continue 2025 through 2027 and is an intrinsic part of the Diocesan Mission Plan.

Commitment to the strategies is vital for effective execution. Clear and consistent communication about the Diocese' mission and strategic goals have been delivered by Bishop, Canons, Staff and Trustees to all constituents including Convocations, Ministers, Vestries and parishioners. Many local parishioners have volunteered to carry out implementation tactics on a local basis.

The Bishop Kemper School is now owned and operated jointly by the Dioceses of Kansas, West Missouri, Nebraska, Iowa, Missouri, and Western Kansas. The ministry formation programs of each of the dioceses have been merged into the Bishop Kemper School for Ministry in Topeka.

Minsters are growing and remain strong. Each of the Diocese's 11 minsters is a group of churches designed for mutual support and sharing of resources, so they can reach out to serve their neighborhoods and communities. Minsters ensure that every congregation is sacramentally cared for by the priests and deacons within each minster. They result in more connections between area parishes, and even across Diocesan borders.

At every meeting, the Council of Trustees receives regular reports from Bishop Bascom and the staff as well as the Transition Ministry, Treasurer, Finance Committee Chair, Canon to the Ordinary, Bethany House and Garden staff, and Youth & Young Adult ministry.

Bethany House & Gardens, dedicated to the Kansas Prairie, serves visitors and students from across the state. It offers garden space for prayer and meditation, spiritual

direction, pastoral care and outdoor worship. The Garden's labyrinth is a work-in-progress. In addition, the Diocese supports two university campus ministries and two social service agencies.

The Diocese of Kansas Council of Trustees is a unicameral organization, also acting as the Standing Committee of the Diocese. Trustees have consented to bishop elections throughout the national Episcopal Church during the year. Additionally, they approved candidate recommendations for ordination to the diaconate and the priesthood. The annual Diocesan Convention was held in person on October 17, 18 and 19 at the Doubletree Convention Center in Wichita, KS.

Spiritual Life

A summation of ministry in Spiritual Life and Clergy Care for the diocese of Kansas in 2024 comes from Brother Roger in Taizé France, Our monastery is here and now, where you are, the people you are speaking with, the room you are sitting in the street where you are walking, the action you are doing now. This is your monastery. This is your prayer. Eternity is now. The city is our monastery.

This year the central new piece of ministry is the formation of the Bethany Community of Saints Mary, Martha, and Lazarus. The vision is to provide a dedicated space for lay and ordained people in the diocese of Kansas to nurture a more contemplative life. Convention in October 2024 the bishop blessed our community and invited us to grow.

The vision is for in-person groups to form around the diocese where there are at least three people dedicated to the community. The community also meets once a month on video conferencing. Each of our meetings includes silent prayer, reflection on our spiritual growth, and conversation with writers on contemplative spirituality.

"Taste and Sees" are what we call opportunities to learn about the community and discern if it is something an individual would like to dedicate themselves to for some time. The community is also forming a core of facilitators trained to hold the space at each gathering. We are building out more information on the diocesan website.

In the role to nurture the spiritual life of the diocese I have been able to offer:

- At home Zoom retreat with Brother Lawrence- January
- Young Adult Silent Retreat- February at Upton Hall
- Supported PhD student in forming a retreat for women focused on her dissertation on the divine feminine. I met with her regularly and joined her for the weekend retreat in April
- Monastery Day- at Atchison at the Mt of St Scholastica – in March
- Retreat on Joy for Breakthrough House-
- St Luke's Shawnee Parish Retreat- in September
- Silent Retreat – in September at Marillac Center
- Advent Quiet Day in December at St Margarets
- Advent Quiet Day in December at St Davids

Discernment

- Spiritual Direction- I continue to help clergy find a SD, I have a small practice with 4 people
- Discernment Day- for those discerning more formal or ordained ministry- at Emporia - in May
- Discernment Retreat – for those discerning more formal or ordained ministry – at Upton Hall, in Aug
- Good Shepherd Retreat for formation team discerning future plans- in June
- Daughters of the King Retreat Leader- at St James Wichita in October
- Convocation Discernment Teams- I continue to over see the four teams, getting new members as needed, offering orientation and supporting their process with the COM

Additionally, Deacon Mary Becker who works closely with me particularly supporting the Bethany Community this year began work to bring Group Spiritual Direction to our diocese. She formed one test group this year and hopes over time to widen the knowledge of this tool for groups around the diocese.

In the role to nurture clergy health and well being this year I have been able to offer:

Clergy Care

- Ordination Retreats in January and June.
- Consultant for Lilly Sabbatical Grant with a couple of priests and celebrated one priest winning a grant
- Clergy Retreat in Oklahoma- 50 clergy made the trip, nurturing a fresh relationship with calling.
- Living God's Future Now with Sam Wells, Andrew Earis and the St Martin Singers – in May at St Michael and All Angels, a several day event for renewal including clergy, laity and church musicians.
- Part of the Long Term Supply Clergy for Good Shepherd in Wichita
- Thresholds in Leadership-a 9 month monthly leadership training and community building gathering for new clergy and new in placement or call clergy.

Vestry Retreats

- Leavenworth Vestry Retreat- focused on Spiritual Friendship and Vestry role as relational leaders
- Wamego vestry Retreat- focused on grieving, review of how things are going and working on skills to confidently reach outside of self.
- St Francis Vestry Retreat with Canon Patrick - in August

The Rev George Wiley continues to support clergy wellness through phone calls, texts and emails keeping up with both active and retired clergy across the diocese. His quiet faithful ministry is deeply appreciated by deacons and priests.

The Rev Shawn Streepy is the official chaplain to the retired clergy. He continues to offer a monthly online bible study, he opened his home for a KC based gathering, he met with retired clergy in Wichita are with the bishop, we hosted retired clergy at the diocesan convention in October to field questions and he attended the CPG regional chaplain event.

I continue to serve on the BKSM Board. I led a retreat outside the diocese in Boston with St Elizabeth's on forming Spiritual Community in Feb 2024. I taught a seminar on Spiritual Direction at Shalem Institute for Spiritual Formation in June.

Convocations

Northeast Convocation

We met three times in 2024: February 17th, May 4th, and September 7th. During these meetings, each parish had an opportunity to discuss what they are doing, as well as struggles they are seeing, and opportunities and improvements with their building and grounds. The meetings also included regular updates from the Council of Trustees as well as Minister updates.

In the NE Convocation, there is tremendous work going on within their parish and community. There are at least 5 parishes that received Alleluia grants, and most of these were the maximum that could be received in 2023.

Of course, the biggest change is the addition of a dedicated Spanish-speaking priest, Fr. Daniel Mafla. 70% of the children speak Spanish, and there is a Spanish-speaking

community around St. Paul's. Fr. Daniel has offered himself to aid any congregation that has a Spanish-speaking community.

Many of the parishes have continued to grow their garden spaces. St. Aidan's has a new butterfly garden, and St. Francis continues to leverage the space they have. The bees continue to thrive, but they are adding a new scatter garden with more flowers for the bees.

Like St. Francis, who sponsors a scouting troop, Trinity Lawrence is now sponsoring a scout troop. The scout troop sponsorships give the youth who participate an opportunity to work on their Eagle Scout projects, as well as the church, to complete large projects. This model has worked well over the years for St. Francis and will work for other congregations.

St. Thomas has reported that they continue to grow and currently have three services. They have many programs that are available to the community, and programs, such as Safe Church, that the parishes in the diocese can leverage.

There were also some movements of clergy within this convocation. Fr. Tom Baker answered the call for St. Margaret's in Lawerance from St. Aidan's in Olathe. Leveraging the support from the All Saints Minster, Fr. Kevin and Mother Mary helped while St. Aidan's searched for a new Priest in Charge.

During our September meeting, it was brought to the officers' attention by Revs. Gar and Kelly Demo that the September meeting is too late in the year to have a discussion regarding the Diocese Budget. It was strongly suggested that we have a meeting to after the budget is ready for presentation to the members at convention, so we are all prepared to ask questions during the meeting prior to convention. In 2024, it was thought that this meeting would be an impromptu meeting, but that didn't work out at all. In 2025, we will have a special meeting for those interested to discuss the budget after the Council of Trustees finalizes it for presentation to the convention.

The Minsters in the N.E. Convocations didn't have a lot to report throughout the year. There is some work going on, and with the new audit processes recommended by the Council of Trustees, we should see more reports and plans for the auditing across this convocation within each Minster.

The N.E. Convocation continues to be a very supportive group for each other. We often ask if there is anything that we can do for each other, and in some cases leaders will informally come together to aid each other.

Northwest Convocation

The Northwest Convocation met in March at St. Luke's in Wamego. The opening prayer was conducted by Rev. Greg Doll, St. Paul's, Marysville. The meeting began with an icebreaker activity. Members mingled and discussed challenges, celebrations, and what centers them. Business included: A Diocesan Youth Update by Karen Schlabach, a Convocation 101 presentation by Rev. Torey Lightcap, a Council of Trustees 101 presentation by Rev. Casey Rohleder, and a Council of Trustees Report by Rev. Casey Rohleder. The Convocation then revisited the small group recommendations from the previous

meeting. The meeting was concluded with a closing prayer by Mary Sier, Manhattan St. Paul's.

The Convocation met again in July at St. Paul's. Clay Center. The opening prayer was led by Rev. Rex Matney, St. Paul's - Clay Center. Introductions/Parish Check-ins were conducted. Nominations were requested for Convocation secretary and Convocation Vice-President Elect (becomes President). A Council of Trustees Report was delivered by Rev. Doreen Rice Dabb. A link to the online minutes was provided. A General Convention Report was delivered by Mr. Larry Hannan and Dean Torey Lightcap, and Rev. Karen Schlabach delivered a Diocesan Youth Update. The Convocation reviewed the Diocesan Convention Pre-preparation packet and was reminded that any business needed to be submitted by August 9th. The Closing Prayer was led by Ms. Melanie Laster, Covenant - Junction City.

The Northwest Convocation prepared for the Convention by meeting at Grace Cathedral in September. The opening Prayer was delivered by Ted Yunglas, Grace Cathedral. Those present heard from Diocesan Staff Jay Currie, Canon Patrick Funston, and Bishop Bascom. Information was shared by representatives of each of the areas included in the Strategic Plan of the Council of Trustees: Congregational Vitality, Justice and Inclusion, Youth and Young Adult Connections, and Clergy and Lay Leadership. The Convocation had introductions/parish check-ins.

The Convocation business included a discussion of an apportionment waiver request by Grace Cathedral. The Cathedral wants to upgrade its lighting to LED. It was decided that Convocation can vote by email when more information becomes available, and a suggestion was made that bylaws should be reviewed/revised. Nominations were requested for the Convocation secretary. Convocation Vice-President Elect (becomes President). The Convocation checking account (\$1292.65) was donated to the Diocesan Friends of the Youth Fund. Closing Prayer - Susan Lunas, St. Luke's – Wamego.

Southeast Convocation

February 18, 2024 – The Southeast Convocation met at St. John's Parsons.

The Convocation celebrated the ordination of both Mother Martha Lamoy and Mother Caroline Howard. Mother Martha is Vicar at Church of the Epiphany, Independence, Church of the Ascension, Neodesha, and St. Paul's, Coffeyville. Mother Caroline will serve as Vicar at St. Mary's, Galena, in addition to being Curate for Creation Care for the Diocese of Kansas. The Southeast Convocation is well represented with three of its members on the Council of Trustees. Father Daryl Stanford, as a Council member, is part of the group studying Congregational Vitality.

June 09, 2024 – The Southeast Convocation met at St. John's Parsons.

St. Timothy's, Iola, held a fundraiser dinner in February for Open, Ltd., which is the organization providing shelter and support for victims of domestic violence across four counties. St. Mary's, Galena, continues its monthly feeding ministry just across the State Line at Watered Gardens in Joplin, MO. St. Peter's, Pittsburg, was honored by the City of Pittsburg's Parks & Recreation Department as one of the Pittsburg Beautiful award-ees for the month of May for the beautiful garden areas in the front of the church. St.

John's, Parsons hosted the Diocesan Chrism Mass on Tuesday of Holy Week with lunch afterwards. Roughly 80 people were in attendance. St. John's also hosted a reception to honor the life of the Rev. Richard McCandless, which was attended by about 16 people. Ascension, Neodesha celebrated Ascension Day on May 9th. Fr. Daryl Stanford was the guest homilist, and they had a great turnout of 25 to 30 people.

Church of the Ascension, Neodesha has continued their ministry with the local Housing Administration, providing basic supplies to low-income families. Epiphany, Independence has noonday and evening prayer led by Gary Mason every day at noon and 6 pm. The Epiphany St. Martha's Guild puts together "blessing bags" for Head Start kids for the time they are away from school to help ensure they have something to eat. Mother Helen attended the Tocher lectures at the cathedral and especially enjoyed the music provided by the choral group from St. Martin in the Fields, London. Calvary supports with donations of food and money the local food bank, which is run by the Methodist Church in their Ministerial Alliance, and reported that someone recently purchased a freezer filled with meat and donated it to the food bank. The local supermarket, G&W Foods, also supports the food bank, which received so many donations that they had to purchase additional shelving to store the groceries in the basement of the Methodist Church. The Baptist Church provides a clothes closet, and the food bank has begun stocking baby supplies.

September 14, 2024— the Southeast Convocation met at St. John's Parsons

Bishop Bascomb introduced visitors from Australia, including Bishop Sonia Roulston and the Reverend Angela Peverell of the Diocese of Newcastle. They are in the US to attend a conference in Minnesota and are visiting Bishop Bascomb and the Diocese of Kansas on the way to learn about our mission and ministries, and particularly about our implementation of minsters. The bishop presented information and conducted a discussion of the Diocesan strategic plan discerned by the Council of Trustees: Congregational Vitality, Justice and Inclusion, Youth and Young Adults, and Nourishing Leadership. St. Peter's, Pittsburg welcomed the ordination of Jeanine Blessant to the permanent diaconate. She will split her time between Parsons and Pittsburg. Grace, Chanute continued working on outreach and getting into the neighborhoods by offering pens and bracelets, and spent time with students at the community college. St. Timothy's, Iola, continued working with Hope Unlimited every other week, which is an outreach program through the summer. St. John's, Parsons, held a reception to honor Fr. McCandless' passing. St. John's celebrated its 150th anniversary, which included a play put on by the kids of the church called "The History of St. John's in No Particular Order". The bishop celebrated Mother Sharon's retirement and presented her with a Bishop's Chair.

Southwest Convocation

The Southwest Convocation of the Diocese of Kansas was vital and active in 2024. The delegates met three times: St. Stephen's, March 2; Grace, July 13; Trinity, Eldorado, September 14.

The three meetings made it clear that the people of our churches have hearts for the homeless, poor, and marginalized of our communities.

- Trinity, Arkansas City, works with House of Hope, a home for the homeless.
- St. Andrew's, Derby, sponsors a prayer trail in its wooded area and a community garden. The church also partners with Breakthrough Clubhouse. Clubhouse members tend a salsa garden at the church two days a week and take the produce back with them
- Trinity, El Dorado, provides meals and support for the growing homeless population. The church has opened part of the building for the Family Life Center. Priscilla's Pantry, a ministry to owners of pets who need food and pet supplies, continues its work to all God's creatures on the fourth Saturday of each month.
- St. Andrew's, Emporia, is a staunch supporter of arts and culture in the city and at the university. The church regularly participates in Emporia First Friday and supports "food for students."
- St. Matthew's, Newton, has opened a Clubhouse of Breakthrough/ESS. The church also opens its doors and hearts to a couple of recovery groups and a mental health group. St. Matthews also sponsors an ESS payee program is also ongoing at Newton, which it has for many years.
- Epiphany, Sedan, serves a free lunch on the third Wednesday of each month. The homemade meal is open to the community, especially to those in need, or single, or alone. The church also participates with other community churches to host the "Fifth Quarter for all students after ballgames during the school year.
- St. Jude's, Wellington's blanket ministry serves as a sterling example of what great deeds a small number of people can do. This ministry now includes other churches of the Churches in the South Central Minster.
- Good Shepherd provides welcome baskets and programs for the homeless, and sack lunches for Sandwich Saturday, held at St. John's. The church also sponsors an on-going grief group.
- St. Bartholomew's members faithfully keep up the long-standing (since the 1960s) clothing ministry called "New to You." Their motto is "Sharing God's great bounty with others – One garment at a time."
- St. James' outreach committee sponsors projects that help local charities and provide some funding for charities that serve families and children in Wichita. The committee also sends prayer cards to ill or grieving parishioners. The church also supports "American Red Cross blood drives; Undies Sundays for the Wichita Children's Home; water bottles for Breakthrough/ESS clients; school supplies for the Pando Initiative schools; blankets for Humankind Ministries shelters; Christmas food baskets and gifts for families served by Breakthrough, KCSL, and St. Francis Ministries; and sack lunches for people who are unhoused."

- St. John's sponsored a new Breakthrough effort - Turning Point - in its adjacent building for most of 2024. The church's Sandwich Saturday program, begun thirty-five years ago, continues to serve those in need of lunch every week. The program is supported by eleven Wichita churches, among them, Good Shepherd, St. Stephen's, St. Andrew's, Derby, and St. James. Members of the church and others also participate in Shower-up during the late spring to early fall months. Homeless persons can have showers with clean towels, soap, and feel well cared for. St. John's also became a United Way tax preparation site. Members of the church also help special education youth from West High every week during the school year. They come every week with their sponsors to help clean up the church building and grounds.
- St. Stephen's opens its doors and hearts to a good number of 12-step and recovery groups, assuring them of complete confidentiality. The church sponsors an annual ice cream social, the proceeds of which go to support the work of Breakthrough/ESS. The church also partners with a neighborhood school to support students, teachers, and staff during the year. In 2024, St. Stephen's also offered a Safe Church seminar presented by Teresa Ryther. Attendees agreed that an in-person workshop setting is much preferable to doing the sessions online.
- Grace, Winfield, is home to the Light Community Center, an accessible meeting space available to area non-profit organizations.

The Wichita area is also home to two Episcopal-related social agencies - St. Francis Ministries and Breakthrough/ESS. Most of the churches support the work of these agencies with their financial and in-kind gifts. For example, several churches supported the Christmas gift program for foster children.

The Convocation welcomed several new lay and clergy delegates. In September, we welcomed Deacon Maddy Bishop-Knoth, who was assigned as a curate to St. Andrew's, Derby, and St. Bartholomew's. (As of January 2025, she is a priest and is a curate at St. Andrew's and a grasslands fellow for the Diocese.) We welcomed Deacon Diane Krueger, formerly of Trinity, El Dorado. She has been assigned as Deacon-in-charge at Epiphany in Sedan. Following her ordination to the priesthood in 2025, she will be the Priest-in-charge there. We also welcomed the Right Reverend Daniel Genovesi, who was called to be the new rector of St. Andrew's, Emporia. With Good Shepherd, we anticipated the arrival of Father Julian Campbell as the new rector.

Convocation delegates also heard some special reports. In March, Dean Laurie Lewis led a table discussion on the work on the Congregational Vitality portion of the Diocesan Strategic Plan.

In July, Julia Hart, Mike Morrow, and Dean Laurie Lewis reported on the 2024 General Convention. They were enthusiastic and informative about the work of the wider Church. Ms. Hart's perspective as a first-time Deputy was particularly engaging and enlightening.

A highlight of the September meeting was the visit by Bishop Cathleen Bascom and members of the Diocesan Staff. Bishop Cathleen brought with her The Right Reverend

Sonia Roulston, Assistant Bishop of Newcastle, Australia, and The Reverend Angela Peverell from Australia.

The gathered parishes of the Southwest Convocation play important roles in their individual communities through their welcome, worship, and service to others. The face of The Episcopal Church is strong in Southwest Kansas, and we pray for its continuance.

Wichita Minster

The Wichita Minster consists of the parishes of Good Shepherd—Wichita, St. John's Wichita, St. Stephen's—Wichita, St. James—Wichita, and two agencies: Breakthrough Episcopal Social Services and Saint Francis Ministries.

The minster team has met monthly on rotation at one of the member facilities. There is robust participation, particularly of the laity. Often, the number of lay attendees in a meeting is greater than the number of clergy members, and at times, laity are the only representatives of a given parish.

The minster continues to focus on supporting Breakthrough ESS with time and talent. The goal is to hold quarterly minster-wide gatherings so that all the individuals throughout the minster can come together in fellowship and worship

Ongoing accomplishments are as follows:

- The parishes of the Wichita Minster continued support for the Sandwich Saturday ministry sponsored by St. John's. The program has been in existence for over 40 years and provides a sack lunch to all who need a lunch every Saturday of the year, rain, shine, or snow.
- Each parish of the Wichita Minster put together and donated nine Welcome Baskets containing basic household goods to the Breakthrough Turning Point rehousing program. This supplied individuals with the essentials: plates, utensils, cleaning supplies, and cookware needed to start a new household.
- St. John's held The Longest Night Memorial on the longest night of the year – December 21st. This year, we remembered that more than seventy unhoused people died on the streets of Wichita. Each individual's name was read aloud, and a candle was lit in their honor. Parishioners, city government officials, family members, and community members attended.
- St. Stephen's hosted a minster-wide Ice Cream Social and BBQ to gather as a community. We enjoyed food, ice cream, and fellowship, and raised funds for Breakthrough ESS.
- Participated in the Kansas Humane Society's Woofstock event with a booth to give blessings to the animals at the event.

Global Partnerships Task Force (Kenya, Nepal, and Haiti)

The three identified Global Task Force ministries continued their work during 2024, expanding efforts post-pandemic. Thanks to the generous support of parish members, diocese members, community members, and in some instances, business members, Kenya, Haiti, and Nepal ministries continued their important work of supporting our brothers and sisters in Christ within some of the poorest areas of the world.

Each ministry is led by teams of individuals, hosting meetings as needed to make decisions for the ministries. These decisions affect the lives of thousands within Kenya, Haiti, and Nepal.

Kansas to Kenya

Reporting for Kenya is Joe Bob Lake for the Community Team and Patrick Parker for the Medical Team. They continued to work on Sustainable Development Goals, and both groups had very successful teams in Kenya this year.

Fundraising Summary:

The Community Team sponsored a golf fundraiser at Falcon Valley on Sunday, October 15, in support of Agatha Amani House. The main fundraiser for the year was Saturday, May 4, 2024, at St. Thomas the Apostle in Overland Park. Ticket sales, silent auction, and donations provided revenue of \$ 21,095, and after expenses, the net was \$ 19,463.

The Medical Team also hosted a successful second independent fundraiser at St Margaret's Episcopal Church in Lawrence, raising a net of \$ 25,810 with \$ 620 in expenses for a net of \$ 25,190.

Both teams plan for similar fundraising events in 2024, and the Community Team will also host a 'Corks for Kenya' fundraiser.

Team Activities

The Community Team supported Agatha's Amani House, a safehouse for women who are victims of sexual or domestic violence. The team did repair and maintenance work on the main house and built a concrete pathway displaying the handprints of survivors and their babies. The team also met with the survivors and staff and exchanged stories. The team received a thorough orientation of the compound and farm, and constructed and planted a banana circle in the farm. The team was briefed on a sewing project that the survivors have undertaken, whereby non-disposable pads were sewn and kits assembled. The survivors and staff distribute the pads to teenage girls in public schools, resulting in a dramatic reduction in absenteeism during their monthly period. K2K supported Karati School for developmentally disabled children and adults with

needed repairs to the meeting room and constructed concrete walks around the meeting room and the entrances to the restrooms. The children needed new shoes, and two pairs of shoes and socks were purchased and given to each student. Two women's conferences were delivered by the team members. One was to a group of approximately thirty Maasai women in their village, and the second was to a group of approximately fifty women assembled at All Saints Anglican Church in Naivasha. We completed our 10-year commitment to the Libraries in Nakuru and Maai Mahiu, turning over the physical spaces and furniture for use to be determined by the Bishop at the Diocese of Nakuru. We held ongoing support to the Diocese of Nakuru while we await the appointment of a new Bishop.

The small team of 13 US participants had a very productive mission trip this year. The Pharmacy Team assisted the University of Nairobi and the University of Kansas Schools of Pharmacy to certify 18 new practicing pharmacists as vaccination providers. The vaccine education program is unique in Kenya.

We then attended the Ordination of Bishop Anthony Mambo, the new Bishop of Nakuru. Bishop Cathleen has invited the bishop and others to participate in the Diocese of Kansas Convention and helped arrange a dialogue with Rev Nancy to assist in planning clinic sites for 2025.

We also had a very productive meeting with Bishop Samson Gachathi, the new Bishop of Nyandarua. They are keen to have us continue to develop programming there as well.

The meetings were followed by a joint team of US and Kenyan physicians, dental staff, nurses, pharmacists, pharmacy students, and volunteers who prepared medications and supplies for 7 days of clinics in Kenyan Community Health Centers in Mirangine in Nyandarua County, Baari Health Centre in Mairo-Inya in Nyandarua County, and Ngubereti Health Centre in Baringo.

The members of the Kenyan dental team developed a proposal to have a quarterly free clinic in the areas we serve to replace the Kijabe Dental program that went silent during the pandemic. We moved forward on the program, having raised donations of \$ 1,500 for instruments as well as additional funding for the first several clinics. We plan to initiate this program in the first quarter of 2025.

Nepal

Reporting for Nepal is Karin Feltman. Nepal continues its programs in rural village areas in the Sindhupalchok district of Northeast Nepal, about nine miles from the border of Tibet. In 2023, we provided 90 at-risk children with scholarships to attend school (rather than be sent abroad to work to earn money for their families). This program includes both basic and higher education, with 6 students enrolled in Bachelor's degree programs in colleges in Kathmandu.

This program also supports a village women's tailoring group, which employs 10 women to sew washable, reusable sanitary pad kits, which they donate to local school-girls to help them attend school daily, even when menstruating. The women earn a good living wage from the work, and in 2023, 1100 girls were provided with free pad kits. In 2024, we will expand our distribution to include girls and women in impoverished areas, as well as for disaster relief. Along with the pad distribution, we provide menstruation and basic women's health training at these schools to all children (boys and girls) in Class 6 and above.

In 2022, we expanded the tailoring business to include beautiful handicrafts that can be sold for sustainability. While not yet fully sustainable, the program is doing well, and the products have been well-received. With the help of another TEAM missionary, we are setting up a website and business plan to open our products to the US market.

On Saturdays (church day here in Nepal), I teach Children's Bible School at the local church, which serves children ages 9-15. They learn about all the major stories in the Bible, as well as the meanings of traditions and holidays. Stories are accompanied by coloring pages and activities to make learning fun. Each class includes prayer, a game, song/dance, and a story with relevant questions, and coloring or craft time afterward. There are currently 6-8 children attending each week.

Haiti

The Haiti report is completed by Lisa Welker, parish of St. Michael and All Angels, Mission. In the calendar year of 2024, many challenges remained unresolved, yet there were moments of joy and celebration. Despite the increasing chaos and ever-worsening violence in the port city of Port-au-Prince (approximately 90% now controlled by gangs), our school and parish in the southern area of Haiti grew in the number of students and parish members. With a consistent average of over 500 students, there is now an influx of displaced children arriving from Port-au-Prince with nothing but the clothing on their bodies.

Once again, the most challenging component of the ministry is the ever-increasing rise in inflation. With basic food, gasoline, and supplies primarily coming through Port-au-Prince, everything that can be found is at an overwhelming price. (Recent data shows an average of a 25% rise each year of the past several years.) Despite our best efforts, we are not able to meet the needs. Furthermore, our ability to send teams is non-existent. The past has shown that once someone visits the loving people of Torbeck, Haiti, they are lifelong supporters.

Communications can be a challenge, yet through the blessing of an English-speaking priest, we stay up to date and communicate frequently through Messenger, Zoom, and

Facebook. We hope in 2025 to be better about including the parish in these Zoom communications at times outside of the conflict of Sunday mornings.

Highlights of 2024 include:

- Teacher and staff pay increases. Retention of teachers remains a primary goal (historically, we have an excellent retention rate) to enhance student outcomes. This remains our primary expense. Although unable to keep up with inflation, we were able to increase essential staff and teacher salaries by 15% last year. This was the first standard pay rise in over 3 years.
- Continued teacher training. Despite the Ministry of Education in Haiti not contributing to the cost, they do demand that training be completed each year. Occasionally, the entire curriculum will be changed, necessitating expensive new textbooks. Fortunately, changes were minor last year.
- Increasing (and repair/replacement) solar capacity to allow continued evening community & school meetings, school celebrations, church celebrations/festivals, and exciting community soccer games.
- Installation of ceiling fans in each classroom to help offset the climate change-induced increases in temperature. This also required additional solar equipment/supplies/installation fees.
- To help the families of the school children, the priest was given a generous discretionary fund to assist families with the purchase of essential school items, help with tuition, and other school needs. Unfortunately, this money was spent immediately, as the need far outweighs the means.
- Thanks to the ministry Agape Flights, who bravely fly into the south of Haiti, avoiding PaP, additional books for the library (in English, French, and Spanish) were sent for the developing school library.

2024 marked the 40th anniversary of St. Michael & All Angels' partnership with St. Paul's school and parish in Torbeck, Haiti. We are proud of this. When our founders asked the Episcopal Bishop of Haiti in 1984 to send them to the "poorest part of Haiti", they went and established this beautiful ministry. Now, we struggle somewhat to maintain the expense and interest in the ministry. Primarily, the parish and foundation of St. Michael's support the program. We would love to see support expanded more within the Diocese population and would entertain support from outside the Episcopal church, if appropriate. With the new administration changes in Washington, DC, the need for aid in all our global partnerships will far exceed our current abilities. We pray for the individuals within our specific ministries, as well as all people suffering from poverty, violence, and loss of hope.

In summary, despite the difficulties of global travel, the Diocese's primary global missions continue to thrive, and our partnerships are as strong as ever. Mission and Outreach Task Force

Outreach efforts through feeding ministries, blanket ministries, spiritual gardens and paths, and various community partnership ministries with schools and other not-for-profit organizations continually remain strong and well supported in this diocese. We are grateful for continued support with our Alleluia Grant, which provides up to \$3,000 in matching grant opportunities for parishes in the diocese that are starting new outreach opportunities or expanding current ones. In 2024, we were blessed to provide a total of \$17 072.30 in grant awards.

Affiliated Institutions

Bishop Kemper School for Ministry

As predicted in the 2023 report, 2024 was definitely a year of significant changes for the Bishop Kemper School for Ministry. Dean Don Compier concluded his ten years of service on August 1, 2024. Consequently, a celebration of his ministry as dean was held on September 6 at Grace and Holy Cathedral in downtown Kansas City, attended by 200 students, faculty, and board members.

During the year, BKSM continued to onboard our latest sponsoring diocese. Although the Diocese of Iowa had been sending students to BKSM prior to last year, it officially joined BKSM as a sponsoring diocese in 2023. There was consensus on the Board that Iowa's addition might be the last diocese accepted for the foreseeable future. As reported last year, BKSM sponsorship and participation now includes six dioceses: Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska, West Missouri, and Western Kansas.

In 2024, representatives Interim Dean Monte Giddings and Assistant Dean Casey Rohleder were able to divide and attend all six Diocesan Conventions to represent BKSM and speak on behalf of the school. This was the first year that BKSM's top leadership has been able to attend all six events due to conflicting dates when the conventions were scheduled.

Dean Don Compier's exit created a need to hire his replacement. Given the short period of time from August to the beginning of 2025, the Board decided that the best option was to conduct a search for an interim dean so that BKSM would have a reasonable time to search for a full-time dean. That search for an interim dean received a limited number of responses, leading to a creative conclusion.

Deacon Monte Giddings and Mother Casey Rohleder submitted a creative proposal for them to partner in serving BKSM for one year as co-deans until the new permanent dean could be found. Both Giddings and Rohleder have extensive experience and understanding of BKSM's vision and operations. Giddings had just completed a 10-year board member role culminating in serving as Chairman of the Board for 2022-2023. Rohleder has served on staff for 10 years, organizing and leading every Focus weekend. The Board accepted their proposal as a unique solution to bridge the gap.

Curricular review continued. Our lay tracks (preaching, catechism, evangelism, pastoral leadership) were revised, and a pilot program in lay chaplaincy was developed.

At the beginning of her role as Chairperson, Deacon Donna Stanford asked the Board to become a "working board" by having all board members join and participate in a Committee. She identified the following committees: Executive Committee, Curricu-

lum Committee, Fundraising Committee, Program Committee, Planning and Marketing Committee, and Finance Committee. Each Board member joined one of those committees and began to meet regularly.

BKSM ended the academic year in 2024 with a total of 53 students, broken down as follows:

Ordination track	21
Lay track	15
Anglican studies	6
Personal Enrichment	11
Total	53

The school began its 2024/2025 academic year with 54 students enrolled.

In 2024, discussions began with the Iona Collaborative regarding BKSM becoming a member or associate of that learning cohort that includes many Episcopal dioceses across the country. Becoming an associate would give BKSM and its students access to the many educational models that Iona has developed over the years. BKSM has long had a working relationship with Iona and Chair Giddings, Dean Compier, and Communications Director Rev. Casey Rohleder participated in a groundbreaking conference at Camp Allen, TX on bi-vocational ministry. At year-end 2024, BKSM leadership was positive about partnering with Iona, but an official decision was not made by the Board.

As former Dean Don Compier reported last year, BKSM graduates represent a significant portion of lay and ordained leadership in our sponsoring dioceses. BKSM graduates serve as deans, canons, leaders of diocesan councils and search committees, and occasionally even as full-time rectors of important parishes. And as of this date, the school sees more dioceses outside our sponsoring dioceses calling students to a variety of ministries.

BKSM finished 2024 actively searching for a new permanent dean to assume his/her position in July of 2025.

As Interim Dean, I would be remiss if I did not commend the work and performance of my colleagues. Casey and Fran have been the glue to holding the organization up to our standards of excellence. I can safely say that BKSM has not compromised its vision in 2024. I can honestly report that we continue to move forward with an eye on distinction in supporting our original and future vision.

As a point of personal privilege, I would like to express my thanks to the Board for entrusting me with the leadership of Bishop Kemper School for Ministry. It is one of the greatest honors of my life.

Bishop Seabury Academy

Bishop Seabury Academy in Lawrence continues to uphold its mission to offer a college preparatory education in a diverse and enthusiastic learning community, promoting academic excellence and moral development while empowering students to explore their potential and to become engaged citizens of the world. There were 182 students enrolled in 2024. Twenty-seven seniors graduated in May of 2024.

Each day begins with the entire school community gathered. Most days, this meet-

ing begins with the Head of School offering a prayer and ends with the entire assembly reciting the Academy prayer. On Wednesdays, the morning assembly takes the form of a chapel service led by School Chaplain, the Rev. Steve Segebrecht.

Service and outreach are vital aspects of the Seabury culture and are a part of our Episcopal identity. The Student Senate plans regular service opportunities and activities. Every year, students participate in projects at or for the Salvation Army Community Shelter, the Lawrence Open Shelter, the Lawrence Interdenominational Nutritional Kitchen, St. Margaret's Church, the Trinity Ecumenical Food Pantry, and other organizations. Seabury middle-school students are encouraged to log a minimum of 20 hours of service to the community each year, upper-school students are required to log a minimum of 30 hours, and seniors are additionally required to develop a service project. Our school remains one of the most vital service organizations in our city.

Breakthrough: Episcopal Social Services

A Year of Growth, Impact, and Transformation

In 2024, Breakthrough Episcopal Social Services made significant strides in expanding our programs and supporting individuals impacted by severe mental illness, homelessness, and poverty. Grounded in the Episcopal tradition of service, compassion, and justice, we remained steadfast in our mission to walk alongside those in need, affirming dignity and advocating for systemic change. Despite challenges in securing sustainable funding, we successfully maintained and expanded our programming, ensuring we continued to meet the evolving needs of the communities we serve.

Impact

Over the past year, we provided critical support to 1,185 individuals, including:

- 550 through our Clubhouse communities
- 139 with employment services
- 122 with housing support
- 50 with therapy
- 30 with spiritual care
- 369 with representative payee services
- 11,532 meals served

Beyond direct assistance, our programs fostered a sense of belonging and improved overall well-being. We helped over 150 individuals secure employment, 44 find stable housing, and 63 pursue education goals. Remarkably, only 8% of our active Clubhouse members required long-term hospitalization, demonstrating the effectiveness of our approach in promoting stability and holistic care.

Expanding the Clubhouse Model

A major milestone this year was the continued expansion of the Clubhouse model, which fosters community, employment, and self-efficacy for individuals with mental illness. We proudly received two three-year accreditations, reinforcing our commitment to evidence-based practice. Additionally, we launched two new Clubhouses, marking

a significant milestone in our growth. Breakthrough now operates four Clubhouses in Wichita, Newton, Hutchinson, and Salina. These new Clubhouses are already making a difference, providing structured environments where members engage in meaningful work, access employment opportunities, and build social connections that enhance their quality of life. The Clubhouse model continues to be a transformative force in our ministry and mission.

Breakthrough's International Initiative: Bungoma, Kenya

A particularly exciting development in 2024 was the launch of a mental health support program in Bungoma, Kenya, inspired by our colleague David Kapten. Recognizing the urgent need for mental health services in his home country of Kenya, we introduced the Clubhouse model to Bungoma, fostering community, employment, and well-being for those in need.

During our visit, we engaged with key stakeholders, including the Bungoma Rotary Club, medical professionals, local universities, and The Right Revd George Mechumo, Anglican Bishop of Bungoma. Bishop Mechumo warmly welcomed our initiative and pledged his support, marking an encouraging step toward creating sustainable mental health programming in the region.

This initiative aligns with the Anglican commitment to holistic care—caring for the body, mind, and spirit. The Bungoma Health Link has quickly become the fastest-growing Clubhouse in our network, serving over 300 members and establishing a social enterprise involving corn farming and poultry raising to promote economic self-sufficiency. We look forward to further strengthening this ministry and building lasting partnerships that advance our shared mission of healing and restoration.

We deepened our collaborations with Wichita Minster and local Episcopal parishes strengthening our collective impact:

- St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Derby – Launched a gardening project providing fresh produce for our lunch program while offering meaningful work opportunities for our members. This initiative reflects our shared commitment to stewardship, creation care, and addressing food insecurity.
- St. John's Episcopal Church in Wichita – Through the Turning Point program, we help individuals with lived experience of homelessness secure employment and navigate complex systems. By providing a safe environment, showers, and breakfast, we empower them to build a more stable future.
- For the third consecutive year, the Wichita Minster Churches provided welcome home baskets for individuals exiting homelessness. In 2024, over 40 baskets were distributed, helping people settle into new homes with essential kitchen and household items.
- Breakthrough Clubhouse Spiritual Retreat. On April 27, 2024, we hosted our second Breakthrough Clubhouse Spiritual Retreat: Finding Joy Amid Hard Times at St. John's Episcopal Church in Wichita. Developed by the Breakthrough Clubhouse Wednesday Morning Prayer Group, the retreat provided trauma-informed spiritual care and an affirming space for healing

and reflection. Co-lead by The Rev. Canon Lisa Senuta, Deacon Peg Flynn and Deacon Lory mills. Attendees shared personal stories, engaged in guided meditation and prayer, and participated in workshops promoting emotional and spiritual well-being. We aim to make this an annual tradition, expanding our capacity to offer spiritual care.

- One of our standout events was the Ice Cream Social and Fundraiser at St. Stephen's with the Wichita Minster, which doubled in attendance from the previous year and raised over \$4,000 through a silent auction. This event exemplified the power of Episcopal community-building and reinforced our shared commitment to social ministry.
- St. James's annual Fat Tuesday Oyster Dinner fundraiser raised over \$5,000 and was another huge success.
- Breakthrough ESS had a strong presence at the 165th Diocesan Convention, where we partnered with Saint Francis Ministries to present our missions. With a full house in attendance, we shared our vision and invited the Diocese to join us in serving those impacted by mental illness and homelessness. This engagement strengthened our ties with the faith community and increased awareness of our work within the broader Episcopal Church.

These partnerships embody our mission to work collaboratively with faith communities and other organizations to create lasting change and opportunities for those we serve.

Fundraising and Financial Sustainability

For the third consecutive year, Breakthrough successfully delivered a balanced budget and ended the year financially stable. While securing adequate funding remains an ongoing challenge, we have maintained our core programming without significant cut-backs. Our financial success in 2024 was made possible through strategic grant writing, efficient resource management, expanded donor engagement, legacy gifts, and strong community partnerships.

Looking Ahead to 2025

As we move into 2025, Breakthrough remains committed to expanding our reach, strengthening our programs, and fostering innovative solutions to the challenges faced by those we serve. Our key priorities include:

- Strengthening our Clubhouse programs by enhancing employment and housing support.
- Building new partnerships with faith communities and local organizations to provide additional resources and support for individuals impacted by poverty and mental health challenges.
- Continuing our financial sustainability efforts to ensure long-term stability and growth by diversifying our funding sources.
- Collaborating with our communities to reach Functional Zero homelessness a point where homelessness is rare, brief, and non-recurring through a well coordinated system of prevention and intervention.

Conclusion

2024 was a year of remarkable growth, impact, and transformation for Breakthrough Episcopal Social Services. From expanding the Clubhouse model to launching an international initiative, hosting a spiritual retreat, and securing financial stability, we have much to celebrate.

As we step into 2025, we remain steadfast in our mission: to create an inclusive and supportive community where individuals impacted by mental illness and poverty can discover opportunities, foster resilience, and improve their quality of life. Rooted in our Episcopal faith, we continue to embrace the call to serve, advocate, and bring hope to those in need.

Daughters of the King

The Order of the Daughters of the King continue their mission of the extension of Christ's Kingdom through Prayer, Service, and Evangelism across our diocese, province, and the world. There are 11 chapters in Kansas with 126 current members. We live by the Rule of the Order and the spiritual discipline of our Rule of Life.

The motto is the guiding principle for our service in whatever form it may take. Outreach is as wide and varied as our chapters and depends on the needs of the communities. 5 of our 11 chapters are engaged in ongoing activities within their communities and churches. These include relationships with local nursing and rehabilitation facilities in sending greeting cards to residents, providing treats and activities for a Mardi Gras party, and participating in a monthly church service there. Breakthrough ESS (mental health support program) is supported by volunteering, soliciting, and transporting donated goods. Flowers from the altar are delivered to those who are ill/shut in or celebrating an occasion each week. Prayer lists are maintained. A variety of food ministries are in place in several parish chapters and one includes the members help with making sack lunches and distributions to the unhoused. Recycle programs are also part of the ministry as part of the Creation Care program. One chapter is helping with support for a refugee family. The most active chapters have ongoing book studies and formal programs at their meetings that have included ways to enhance their spiritual development. Our daily prayers continue through our intercession lists. Daughters will respond to prayer requests at any time.

We are still struggling with keeping our members involved in the diocesan assembly meetings but we do have a small, dedicated group of chapters that continue to gather and fulfill our commitment as members of the Order of the Daughters of the King.

Any woman who is a communicant of the Episcopal Church, churches in communion with it, or churches in the historic episcopate but not in communion with it, may become a Daughter. There is a discernment process to determine if this is what you are being called to do and we welcome the opportunity to bring others into the Order.

During 2024 we continued our Assembly meetings in person and sometimes via

ZOOM to conduct business and stay in touch. As president of the Assembly of the DOK of Kansas, I have attended the Province VII board meetings and Province VII Assemblies. Our next Assembly for the Diocese of Kansas will be in May, 2025.

At our Assembly in October of 2024 our new officers were elected and their term started September 1, 2024. They are:

Episcopal Church Women

The Episcopal Church Women of the Diocese of Kansas represent all women in the parishes of this diocese. Our purpose: To work among women to foster, develop, and affirm the ministry of all people in this Diocese.

Our ECW Triennial event was held at the 2024 General Convention in Louisville, KY. We had 4 delegates represent our Kansas ECW delegation at this Triennial, along with another one of our board members serving as a volunteer with the United Thank Offering events and various ministries served during this gathering. We had several small by-law revisions voted upon, National ECW board elections, various workshops and programs, worship, a special opening, and a special closing ceremony, which included the traditional distribution of ECW crosses. Each triennial a special cross is made representing the theme of the triennial event. The crosses are blessed and presented to each delegate by the Presiding Bishop.

Our Kansas Distinguished Woman selected in the Diocese of Kansas at this Triennial was Charlotte Buterbaugh from Grace Episcopal in Winfield, KS. She was honored at an ECW Luncheon along with other Distinguished women awardees from other Diocesan ECW organizations. Before her passing shortly after our celebratory time in Louisville, she was an active member of Grace Episcopal Church in Winfield, KS. Charlotte served as a Lector, choir member, served multiple terms on the vestry, directed the youth choir, was a Sunday school teacher, and served as a church camp counselor at Camp Wood. She was a youth group leader, a payee rep through Episcopal Social Services, served as a delegate for several General Conventions, was an active member of Daughters of the King, and had participated actively on the Kansas ECW board since 2016 by holding various positions such as Devotional Chair, SW Convocation Rep, and as a delegate for ECW Triennial. She also served faithfully as the ECW Church Women United Representative and served in a variety of CWU roles in that position, most notably as the President of the Kansas chapter. Charlotte was a joyous blessing to our board, and we were honored to call her our sister.

Our ECW board in this diocese, like many other dioceses, has dropped in size over the course of the past 15+ years. As our diocese does not have active local chapters any

longer, we, as a board, have had to rethink outside of the box in creative ways to connect with other women in the diocese. Our Women’s Summits have been the way we’ve been able to continue providing programs and spiritual support as a way to maintain our mission, which is mentioned above. We have traditionally held these summits every three years and look forward to coordinating the next one in 2027. In between these summits, we continue to promote and participate with our Provincial ECW sisters with retreats/ events sponsored by them every September. The next one will take place on September 13, 2025, in Oklahoma City.

Two of our Diocesan ECW Board members continue to serve on the Province VII ECW Board: Daria Condon serves as the Province VII UTO Representative, and Deacon Fran Wheeler continues to serve as the Province VII ECW President.

We reinstated our Fair Share asking several years ago, and continue to be incredibly grateful for the past year’s fair share contributions received. We hope that Kansas parishes will continue to prayerfully consider supporting ECW with these Fair Share contributions. These contributions are used generously to provide 1) Continuing Education scholarships for women in the diocese, 2) Diocesan contributions to the Church Periodical Club, which provides both religious and secular literature and related materials to those in need, 3) Assistance with costs affiliated in sending ECW delegates to Triennial, which takes place in conjunction with the Episcopal Church’s General Convention, and 4) Funding for speakers at ECW gatherings and Women’s Summits.

Over the past three years, Nourish KC Community Kitchen has experienced remarkable growth, serving an increasing number of individuals and families in Kansas City. The merger with The Prospect KC in 2024 further strengthened our ability to combat food insecurity, expand meal services, enhance workforce development programs, and rescue more food from waste.

However, food insecurity continues to rise, and potential cuts to federal funding pose a significant risk to the sustainability of our programs. As we look ahead, we remain committed to expanding services, strengthening community partnerships, and advocating for policies that protect access to nutritious food. 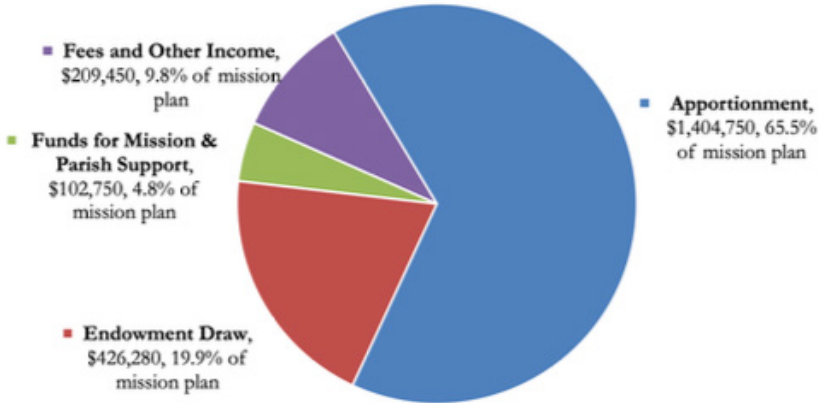

2025 Mission Plan Narrative

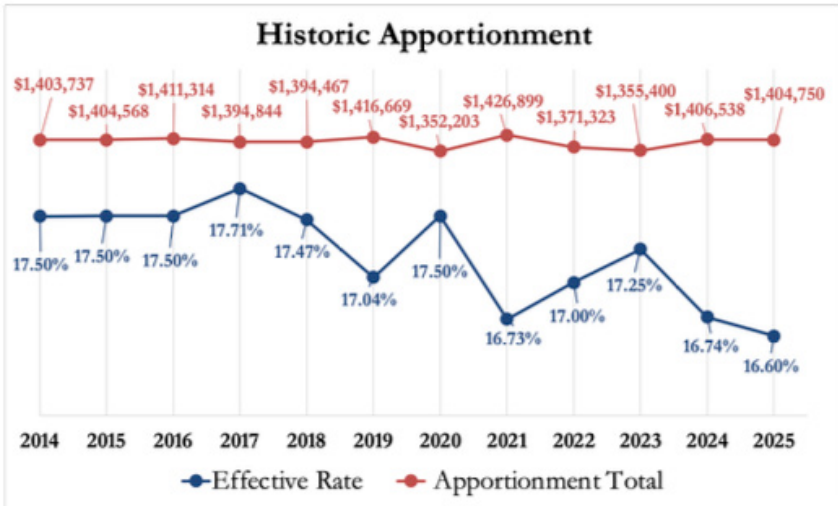

Use of Resources

As required by canon, convention adopts balanced mission plans. As such, the total expenditures in the proposed 2025 mission plan are \$2,143,230. The previous expenditures of the diocese have totaled:



Overall the 2025 mission plan reflects ongoing mission priorities with an eye toward the priorities of the Council of Trustees as articulated in the Strategic Plan currently in development.

Mission Plan Categories

Adult Formation

The diocese continues to support Education for Ministry as a primary means of Adult Formation. The Cursillo movement is also supported.

Bethany Place

The buildings and lawns of the Diocesan Offices, Upton Hall and Bethany House are included in this category.

Upton Hall serves as the main diocesan meeting space, seeing regular use by staff, the Council of Trustees and other commissions, committees, and task forces. Canon Lisa Senuta offices at Upton Hall.

Upton Hall's twenty-one beds fill each month for the students of the Bishop Kemper School for Ministry and various retreats. Upton Hall is available for use by parishes, agencies, and other community organizations.

Bethany House, the former diocesan offices, is now fully-functioning as a residence and office space for the staff and interns of Bethany House & Garden.

Sexton and Groundskeeper salaries are in this category.

Bishop Kemper School for Ministry

The Bishop Kemper School for Ministry is supported by a strategic and fiscal partnership of the Dioceses of Kansas, Western Kansas, Iowa, Missouri, West Missouri, and Nebraska. This section of the mission plan includes Kansas' fiscal support and tuition partnership for Kansas students who are formally in the ordination process having been named postulants by the bishop..

Campus Ministry

The Rev. Karen Schlabach serves as Campus Missioner for the diocese and her salary and benefits are within the Youth Ministry category. This category includes expenses specifically related to campus ministry including funding for grants for parish-based campus ministry programs. Other expenses are specific to the ministry at the two Canterbury Houses including facility expenses for the properties: utilities, maintenance, insurance, etc.

In line with the bishop's vision for campus ministry, the 2025 Mission Plan continues the move away from the previous model of Program Assistants who live at the two Canterbury Houses. The mission plan includes provision for a part-time curacy position to support the ministry at the Canterbury Houses.

Commission on Ministry

The Commission on Ministry (COM) is a canonical body required by Title III of the Canons of the Episcopal Church. It works with the bishop to discern and equip persons for the ministry needs of the diocese. Budgeted items in this category reflect the ongoing work of the vocation and ordination discernment process including travel for seminarians and administrative expenses. The Examining Chaplains advise the COM and the bishop on the results of the annual General Ordination Examinations and are responsible for prescribing and administering any necessary remediation before ordination.

Communications

Chad Senuta serves as the Director of Communications managing the various print and digital communications of the diocese. This year's mission plan expects regular editions of The Harvest and DioLog. Changes for 2025 include budget provision for

Spanish translation and interpretation to support the diocesan ministry of Spanish-speaking clergy and lay people.

Community Life

This area includes items related to meetings that incorporate aspects of our common life as a community of faith. Included are the expenses for the annual Diocesan Convention (2025 is anticipated to be in the Northeast Convocation), as well as the escrow for the triennial General Convention and the approximately-decennial Lambeth Conference.

Congregational Development

In keeping with Bishop Bascom's desire for support of Minsters, the Congregational Development category sees some expanded funding. Support for extant Minister Priests continues in the Agape, Missouri River, and Little Church on the Prairie minsters. New line items include support for a curacy in South Wichita and Derby.

Support for Spanish-speaking ministries within the diocese has moved to the Mission and Outreach category.

Strategic planning work at the Council of Trustees has led to the elimination of the Canon for Congregational Life position and the transformation of the Missioner for Transitions position into Transition Ministry Coach. This new hire will join the bishop, Canon to the Ordinary, and Director of Operations as part of Transition Ministry Team, working with congregations in the midst of clergy transition.

The Convention will note the absence of the diocese's debt service related to assuming the bank note of St. Margaret's, Lawrence in 2011. Following a 2023 capital campaign, the parish has made significant progress on their diocesan note allowing the diocese to pay off its bank note in 2024. The renegotiated balance of the St. Margaret's-Diocese note has been accounted for on the income side.

Council of Trustees

The Council of Trustees works with the bishop as the canonical Standing Committee, managing the affairs of the diocese between conventions. The Mission Plan anticipates at least one retreat and other Council expenses. While the majority of the Council's work occurs on Zoom, five in-person meetings are planned.

Liturgies for the Diocese

This category anticipates costs associated with diocesan liturgies including musician stipends and music printing and streaming licenses

Mission Management

The operations and facilities expenses of the diocesan office are included in this category. Major items in this category are equipment, utilities, maintenance, and

property and liability insurance. Other administrative expenses include lay retiree health insurance, workers' compensation insurance, and the annual audit. Auto escrow has been consolidated into this category, having been previously distributed among several categories.

The salary and benefits of the Comptroller, Director of Operations, and Executive Assistant to the Bishop are under this heading. Increases above the 3.48% cost of living adjustment given to all staff represent a salary increase for the Director of Operations reflecting the variety of additional roles she's taken on since 2021 including a role on the Transition Ministry Team.

Mission and Outreach

The Diocese of Kansas continues to be a strong supporter of the wider church. Once again, the 2025 mission plan provides for the full asking to support the work of The Episcopal Church.

In 2025, the Rev. Caroline Howard will serve as Missioner for Creation Care. Part of her salary and all of her benefits are found in this category. The other part of her salary is carried under the Seminarian and Curate Support category.

Support for urban ministry hubs in Wichita and Kansas City have been moved into this category from Congregational Development. In 2024, the bishop hired the Rt. Rev. Daniel Genovesi as Multi-Cultural Consultant to support clergy and congregations engaging in ministry across language differences.

Expenses related to diocesan task forces are found in this category.

Office of the Bishop

Bishop Bascom provides vision and leadership for the Diocese of Kansas. This section of the mission plan provides resources for the bishop to carry out her ministry in the diocese. 2025 sees an increase in the bishop's auto expenses to account for a newer vehicle purchased following the diocese's lending her previous vehicle to the Rev. Daniel Maffa, Vicar of St. Paul's, Kansas City.

Stipends for two Archdeacons and four Convocation Deans are in this section.

Office of the Canon to the Ordinary

The Canon to the Ordinary is the chief administrative officer for the diocese and primary counselor to the bishop. The Rev. Patrick Funston works closely with members of the staff to administer a variety of diocesan functions including the ordination process, clergy transition and deployment, and congregation-clergy relationships. The Canon also leads staff planning for diocesan convention, ordinations, and other major events in the life of the diocese.

Seminarian and Curate Support

The diocese supports the first two years of initial placements of graduates from residential seminaries. The diocese continues to partner with St. Mary's, Galena to

provide a curacy for the Rev. Caroline Howard.

The Rt. Rev. Alan Scarfe will continue as New Clergy Coach in 2025. Bishop Scarfe supports new priests and deacons in developing their leadership competencies and clerical identities and participates in the monthly Thresholds in Leadership gatherings.

Spiritual Life and Wellness

Formerly called “Clergy Support,” the Spiritual Life and Wellness category covers much of the ministry of the Rev. Lisa Senuta, Canon for Spiritual Life and Clergy Care including retreats, spiritual direction, and pastoral care. At diocesan convention in 2024, Canon Lisa and the bishop announced the formal launch of a new diocesan spiritual community called the Bethany Community of Saints Mary, Martha, and Lazarus, and the 2025 mission plan includes funding to support the Community’s gatherings. Adjustments to this category include provision for changes to the annual Gathering of Clergy along with the increasing availability of spiritual retreats for the whole diocese.

Stewardship and Development

The Stewardship and Development Committee advises the bishop on matters of stewardship and fund raising. Diocesan membership in The Episcopal Network for Stewardship (TENS) allows all parishes to access their extensive resources and trainings. Holy Currencies has been added to the mission plan for 2025 with a hope that the diocese might engage this model of stewardship and vitality.

Youth Ministries

Though alphabetically last in the mission plan, Youth Ministry continues to be a strong-point in diocesan life. Youth, Young Adult, and Campus Missioner Karen Schlabach’s salary and benefits are reflected in the category along with other costs associated with supporting a diocesan youth ministry. Several items in this category are off-set by fees paid by youth and their families along with congregations and scholarships.

Recent strategic planning work by the Council of Trustees has identified camp and youth event affordability and sustainability as a key objective. \$1,000 and a new line item are added to support 2025 planning for the creation of a new endowment and a campaign to fund it in 2026 and beyond.
